

Lajes link remains vital asset

Lajes Field's strategic importance to the Defense Department and the partnership the U.S. has with the Portuguese are paramount in the continuing global war on terrorism, according to two of top leaders in the European theater.

Gen. Charles Wald, deputy commander of U.S. European Command and Maj. Gen. Michael Wooley, 3rd Air Force commander, said having a base in the Azores offers the U.S. and its allies advantage to move around the world and conduct operations. Both generals visited Lajes May 7.

"It's a very strategic location for the United States," Wooley said. "For many, many years, this will remain a strategic place that we will maintain some sort of presence in."

Wooley, who said he's been "passing through" Lajes since 1973, took the opportunity to meet with 65th Air Base Wing members. He also talked to airmen in the Air National Guard-composed KC-135 tanker task force stationed here during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

He thanked them for their work as they wound down their stay at Lajes.

"They are great citizen airmen," he said of the Guardsmen serving at Lajes. "I'm glad I got a chance to thank them."

Meanwhile, the deputy commander of U.S. European Command also emphasized the importance of having an air base here. Lajes joined EUCOM in October 2002. Since then, Wald said EUCOM and U.S. Central Command have used Lajes as part of the air bridge to get troops to war and home again.

The European theater is home to more than 106,000 military people and covers 14 million square miles. Wald said the face and shape of EUCOM is changing.

"We see an adjustment of our basing. We're in the process of doing that now," he said. He added that the senior leadership of U.S. European Command and other commands are developing a plan to forecast what the theater will look like three to 15 years from now.

Even as the European theater evolves and senior defense leaders look at the building blocks for the future, Wald said

being able to land at a place where 60 million gallons of fuel is available is a big plus for war planners.

"Lajes is a part of almost every mission we do," he said. "Having that (refueling) capacity is pretty nice."

The 3rd Air Force commander said as the Air Force shapes itself to be more "light, lean and lethal," Lajes will continue to be part of that shaping. He assessed his command's performance during Operation Iraqi Freedom as "outstanding" and lauded the work done by the people here.

"When I look back at the performance of the men and women of Team Lajes, it is just absolutely outstanding. I wish I could go around personally," Wooley said, "and give each one of them a big hug and say 'thank you for what you do every day.'"

Wald also lauded the people here and ensured after eight months of membership, he welcomed them properly.

"We're very proud to have you as a member of the EUCOM family. It makes sense and we'll make sure you get the proper love and care," Wald concluded.

The generals were at Lajes to preside over the 65th Air Base Wing's change of command.

were the University of California at Berkeley and the U.S. Military Academy.

Semi-final and final Division I games for both men and women are being broadcast through May 18 on College Sports Television.

Per diem extensions

Air reserve component officials at the Pentagon are reminding reservists and Air National guardsmen that those called to active duty to support Operation Iraqi Freedom will receive per diem consistent with periods established for other recent conflicts.

Reservists and guardsmen ordered to support major military operations are normally entitled to receive per diem for up to 730 days at one location, according to officials.

The two-year entitlement, originally designed for operations Noble Eagle and Enduring Freedom, also applies to OIF.

The officials were concerned that reservists and guardsmen would confuse an earlier change to active-duty entitlements — establishing group waivers to receive entitlements beyond 179 days — to mean they would not receive per diem for current contingency operations.

Per diem entitlements under the two-year authority are not taxable and cannot be arbitrarily reduced, according to the officials. Per diem is not payable to people in a commuting status.

In addition, dependents of airmen who are ordered to duty for 31 consecutive days are eligible for enrollment in Tricare Prime, the officials said. This is a change to the previous policy requiring 179 days of continuous active duty for enrollment.

Tips on mess dress wear

The following guidelines on mess dress wear come from Air Force Instruction 36-2903, Dress and Personal Appearance of Air Force Personnel:

- Aeronautical and chaplain badges are mandatory. Others are optional. Center aeronautical, occupational, or miscellaneous badge 1/2 inch above top row of medals or when not authorized medals, midway between shoulder and top button. Wear either highly polished or satin finished badges, cuff links or studs. Wear cuff links and studs as a set. Don't mix highly polished or satin finish.

- Center miniature medals between lapel and arm seam and midway between top shoulder seam and top button of jacket.

- Center duty or miscellaneous badge 1/2 inch below bottom row of medals or comparable position when no medals are authorized, and/or on top right side in same relative position as those badges worn on left.

Survival of the Fittest

■ Don't be a Darwin Award winner

Naturalist Charles Darwin proposed a theory that only the fittest species survive and others who are unable to adapt die out.

Safety officials must often feel that mankind is traveling the road to extinction. Rules are created to protect people from themselves, though many continue to believe they are the exception to those rules.

The Darwin Awards, an international honor to "those who improve our gene pool by removing themselves from it," is one indication that people haven't caught on to the idea of "operational risk management" yet. ORM, a safety official's mantra, is simply considering the consequences of one's actions to avoid suffering the slings and arrows of outrageous misfortunes.

The following Darwin Awards winners didn't practice this simple concept. They were otherwise normal people who boldly put their brains on hold for a few moments and, as a result, won the uncoveted Darwin.

Life and limbs

A British tree trimmer sought to save time by burning old tree limbs at the base of the tree he was trimming. He built a fire and added limbs to the blaze from above — where he sat in the tree. If he had taken a few seconds to evaluate this scenario, he probably would have used common sense and broken this task down into two distinct, safe processes: cutting the limbs and burning them away from his work area. He didn't.



Can you hear me now?

In Kansas, a man was struck and killed by a train while using his cell phone to call for help after his vehicle broke down. The train engineer spotted him standing on the tracks holding a cell phone to one ear and cupping his hand over the other to keep from being distracted by the inconsiderate noise of a train horn. With time-honored cell phone etiquette,



the man remained focused on his call and became locomotive fodder.

Man's best friend

Another award winner in the Ukraine was walking his dog when a police cadet pointed out that dogs in that area must be walked with a muzzle and a leash.

The pair began to argue and the man threw a grenade at the cadet's feet. The dog saved the day for the cadet when he fetched the explosive prize and dutifully returned it to his master for the last time.

Clearly, some of these folks are not the sharpest pencils in the drawer, but many of us become candidates for Darwins in our everyday lives.



European theater changing over time

The face and shape of the U.S. military presence in Europe has transformed dramatically over the years, and European Command's second highest official said more transformation is likely as U.S. forces respond to current geo-political factors.

During a visit here May 7, Gen. Charles Wald, EUCOM vice commander, said Europe remains a focal point for U.S. military operations, however, military activity within the region may shift from traditional European areas.

"Europe is still the center of gravity, but the center of activity is moving south and east," Wald related.

Specifically, Wald said geo-strategic points in Europe have changed from central Europe in the post-World War II era to areas near the Caucasus and the Caspian Sea. As evidence of that, Air Force air-refueling units op-

erated out of Bulgaria and Romania during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

For military people wanting to come to Europe on assignment, that may mean some changes, Wald said, including the potential for more exercises and leaner units.

"We see an adjustment of our basing. We're in the process of doing that now," he said. He added that the senior leadership of U.S. European Command and other commands are developing a plan to forecast what the theater will look like three to 15 years from now.

"Will they be large, permanent bases that have large infrastructure with families, or are they bases that can sustain a rotational force where people come and go where

equipment might be prepositioned?" he asked. "And then, where would you want them to be? You have to really think it through. You have to have some crystal ball activity going on."

Wald's boss, EUCOM Commander Marine Gen. James Jones, told Congress in the fiscal year 2003 command posture statement that he's looking for the most efficient ways to house troops and resources.

"By identifying potential excess installations and means of making more efficient use of our existing infrastructure," Jones said, "we are ensuring that our future military construction and sustainment, restoration and modernization investments are focused on enduring installations."

Wald said he believes there would be "some" forces moved out of the theater, but didn't foresee a major military force reduction.

"If there are forces that go back to the U.S., they have to have a place to live and work. It could be that some of the forces goes back to their families and rotate back here for training," he said.

Wald emphasized, however, that the time had come to look at transforming the command into something better.

"It's time to do that. Our work in Iraq was a big success. Europe is on its own feet right now," he said. "Within the next month or so, we've got a lot of work to do."

"We'll still need a fairly significant force in Europe and we still want to be able to project forces from Europe," he added.

Wald's command manages the activities of more than 100,000 U.S. forces with responsibility for 14 million square miles across 91 countries.

■ Chief Gaylor was born in Bellevue, Iowa; however, most of his youth was spent in Indiana.

■ He entered the Air Force in September 1948 and was assigned to the security police career field, in which he served until 1957.

■ In September 1957 he served as a military training instructor at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, until February 1962.

■ He then returned to the security police field until July 1965.

■ He became chief master sergeant of the Air Force in 1977 and retired July 31, 1979.

■ He was the fifth chief master sergeant appointed to this ultimate noncommissioned officer position.

■ The President of the Mess is always indisputably correct.

■ Should the President of the Mess appear to make a mistake, refer to the first rule.

■ Thou shalt not murder the Queen's English.

■ Thou shalt always use proper toasting procedures.

■ Thou shalt consume thy meal in a manner becoming of gentle persons.

■ Thou shalt not laugh at ridiculously funny comments unless the President first approves.

■ Thou shalt express approval by tapping thy spoon on the table. Clapping of the hands will not be tolerated.

■ Thou shalt not question the decision of the president.

■ Thou shalt not bring any beverages into the mess.

■ Mess dress or semi-formal uniform is the appropriate attire.

■ When the mess adjourns, thou shalt rise and wait for the president and his/her guests to leave.

■ Thou shalt enjoy thyself to the fullest.


