

Assessment checks security

A 10-person team from the Defense Threat Reduction Agency will travel to Lajes for a Joint Staff Integrated Vulnerability Assessment June 23-30.

As a Department of Defense-wide requirement for every installation at least every three years, the assessment focuses on the entire force protection and antiterrorism program, according to Master Sgt. Roy Wertz, installation antiterrorism officer.

During its seven days here, the team will look at everything from how the base engineers facilities to how people conduct day-to-day security operations, Wertz said. They'll also assess the wing's disaster response capabilities for weapons of mass destruction and major accidents.

Although Wertz said many people won't see the team in action, it will be paying close attention to almost every facility on base.

"For example, if we say we do walk-around facility checks, they might sit outside the

building to see if we actually conduct the checks," he said.

Assessments like this have always been important, but Wertz said they're even more important now.

"We know terrorist threats exist. We know that the western way of life is the target,"

he said. "Having this team come in and give us a report card on how well we're doing our job will help us deter terrorist acts.

"The whole point of antiterrorism and force protection is to make us an unlikely target," he explained. "To make terror-

ism go down the road. It's a lot like crime prevention. If you have bars on your windows, the doors locked and a security system installed, a burglar's probably not going to hit your house. He'll probably go do the road to the guy who leaves his back door unlocked."

First OIF court martial

An airman first class from the 405th Expeditionary Munitions Squadron at a forward-deployed location in Southwest Asia pleaded and was found guilty May 18 of larceny and violation of a general lawful order.

This was the first Air Force court-martial held at an Operation Iraqi Freedom deployed location.

William W. Wheeler, 19, from Ellsworth Air Force Base, S.D., admitted he stole more than \$7,500 worth of merchandise ranging from digital videodisk players and movies to chewing gum and breath mints. Wheeler was a volunteer at the tactical base exchange store where he stole the items over a three-and-a-half-week period. He admitted to receiv-



ing and possessing pornographic and sexually explicit material from a fellow airman, which was a violation of a lawful general order.

Wheeler received a reduction in grade to E-1, seven months confinement and a bad conduct discharge with automatic forfeiture of two-thirds of his basic pay for the length of his confinement. The judge also recommended the convening authority waive the automatic forfeitures and allow the pay to go to "Airman Wheeler's wife, who is also a victim of (Wheeler's) crimes," according to the judge.

Enlisted aide upgraded

They have been part of the Air Force enlisted force since its beginning, but they have never had a formalized position description or job qualification standard — until now.

The enlisted aide program, now an official Air Force special duty, was authorized the new Air Force Specialty Code of 8A200 last October. Before the AFSC assignment, enlisted aides worked under a generic code of 9G000, which did not authorize specialty training.

Enlisted aide duty is a voluntary special duty open to all career airmen, Murdock explained. Qualified enlisted members who pass an extensive screening process are assigned to specific general officers, relieving them of tasks and details that could affect the officers' primary duties if they had to perform them.

The duties of an enlisted aide vary since they are tailored to the needs of each general officer. However, most enlisted aides perform such tasks as: meal preparation, to include menu planning and shopping; housekeeping, to include daily routine tasks; maintaining the gen-

Military travelers must use split disbursement

THE PENTAGON — All military travelers must now select the 'split disbursement' option on their travel voucher claims to directly pay their government travel card expenses, according to finance officials.

'Split disbursement' requires travelers to tally up their GTC expenses and authorize enough funds to be sent automatically to Bank of America to pay off their charges, said Michael G. Weber, Air Force travel card program manager at the Pentagon. Any remaining travel settlement will still be sent to the traveler's personal account.

This change was mandated by the 2003 National Defense Authorization Act to reduce the number of delinquent travel

card accounts. It also simplifies the payment process for travelers, gets the bank their money more quickly and reduces the number of delinquent accounts.

Nearly half of all Air Force travelers already use split disbursement on a regular basis when filing their vouchers because it simplifies the process for them, Weber said.

By having all travelers pay off their travel card bills automatically, the Air Force should see a decrease in the number of delinquent accounts, he said. This is especially true if a traveler returns from a TDY as a billing cycle is about to turn over, because they can pay off the card before their account becomes 30 days past due.

eral officer's uniforms; outside chores, such as lawn care and gardening; and arranging official social events.

Tanker lease program

The approval of the Air Force KC-767 tanker lease initiative was announced May 23 by Edward C. "Pete" Aldridge, under secretary of Defense for Acquisi-



tion, Technology and Logistics.

The agreement provides for leasing 100 KC-767 aircraft from the Boeing Co. for six years starting in 2006, at a cost of \$138 million per aircraft. The initiative also includes a provision to purchase the aircraft for about \$4 billion at the end of the lease in 2017.

The strategy allows the Air Force to begin replacing the KC-135E tanker fleet three years earlier than planned. With an average age of over 43 years, E-model KC-135s make up the oldest weapons system in the Air Force inventory.

The KC-767 will be the world's newest and most advanced tanker. It can offload 20 percent more fuel than the KC-135E and unlike the E-model, can itself be refueled in flight. It will also have the capability to refuel Air Force, Navy, Marine and allied aircraft on every mission.

New commander joins USAFE in June

RAMSTEIN AB, Germany — Department of Defense officials announced May 20 that Gen. Gregory S. Martin, U.S. Air Forces in Europe commander, will assume command of the Air Force Materiel Command at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, and Gen. Robert H. Foglesong, the Air Force vice chief of staff at the Pentagon, will assume command of USAFE here in late June.

Previously, he served as deputy chief of staff for Air and Space Operations, U.S. Air Force headquarters at the Pentagon, Washington, D.C.

This is also tourist season when thousands of Azorean immigrants return to the islands to celebrate with relatives and friends. Most of the island festivals have cultural and religious origins, some dating back hundreds of years.

Each town around the island has its own festival, even the smallest towns, usually to honor their patron saints at a certain time of the year.

These summer festivals generally begin with a religious procession on Sunday afternoons. The evenings are usually preempted with concerts by rock bands, folklore groups or marching bands. Later in the week is time for the street bullfights, usually two or three.

Sanjoaninas Festival, the largest cultural event on the island. This festival attracts thousands of tourists from the Azorean communities in the U.S. and Canada, mainland Portugal and the other Azorean islands.

This year's Sanjoaninas will take place June 20-29 in the main streets and squares of Angra and it will feature parades, concerts, expositions, bullfights, sports activities, and two performances by the U.S. Air Forces in Europe band June 26-27 at 10 p.m.

Praia's party

The city of Praia will also host a similar festival Aug. 1-11.

Besides parades, concerts and other cultural activities, the festival known to the Americans on the island as "Praia Fest," also features a bullfight on the beach and

a food fair with several restaurants from various regions of Portugal and Germany, offering cuisine specialties to illustrate the flavor of their regions.

Wine and song

The Wine Festival usually happens the second or third weekend in September in the wine museum in the village of Biscoitos. During the Saturday's afternoon, people gather at the museum around 1 or 2 p.m. and parade down to the vineyards to pick the grapes. After picking the grapes, another parade forms heading back to the museum. Once there, participants are invited to stomp the grapes with their bare feet (the old traditional way) and taste the new wine and other season specialties.

The summer festival season ends in October in the village of Lajes.

How will new housing be assigned?

Question: Thank you for holding the open house last week to allow our community to see a sampling of the new housing units. They are very nice. My question is what is the policy on assignment of the new houses?

Answer: We are making great efforts to ensure that everyone has housing that meets Air Force standards as soon as possible. Our housing assignment procedures are outlined in Air Force Instruction 32-6001 and its Lajes Field supplement. In addition to airmen, command-sponsored civilian employees can also be assigned by installation commanders to base housing at overseas locations, and this authority is exercised at Lajes.

Command-sponsored civilians are limited to five years in base housing. Housing units are assigned first-come, first-served based on an individual's grade. Bluesuiters and equivalent graded civilians are treated the same in assignment of units. However, those assigned to positions designated as "key and essential," including some commanders and first sergeants, have priority over all others on the waiting list.

Those people in key and essential positions are required to live on base because of their job duties. Those in essential positions are identified in the Air Force instruction. Further, a few units on base are specifically designated for senior leaders. Once the new housing units are ready for occupancy in June, we'll use the normal waiting list process and accommodate those residents whose housing units are scheduled for demolition. That includes some units in Upper and Lower T.

The housing assignment policy will be to minimize multiple moves as a result of the Phase 3 construction in Lower T that should begin in late fall of 2004. This will only affect field-grade housing assignments. During the Phase 3 project there will be a phased demolition and construction plan. This will require us to leave some units vacant, making it necessary for some families remaining in the old units to move out during construction of Phase 3.

Our goal is to minimize inconvenience and relocate as few families as possible. To do this, we are trying to empty these old units during the summer and fall of 2004 and leave them vacant until demolished. Therefore, our assignment policy will be to fill the newly constructed field-grade units with military and civilian equivalent residents who have approximately 24 months until their date eligible to return from overseas.

For example, field-grade military and civilian-equivalent members already on station with DEROS earlier than December 2004 who are on the waiting list will be assigned to existing field units in Lower-T (not newly constructed field-grade units) as they become available. This will eliminate the need to move inbound field-grade officers twice. Once again, we hope this policy will minimize the inconvenience to as many families as possible.

Another factor that directly impacts the availability and waiting time for on-base housing is the number of units that are constructed and maintained. The Air Force's formal process for determining the right number of military family housing units at each installation is the Housing Requirements Marketing Analysis. The analysis follows Department of Defense guidance that mandates the military services to utilize acceptable off-base housing for their

military and civilian members.

The analysis compares the local market supply of acceptable units with customer demand. The difference is the on-base military family housing requirement, which is currently 507 units. Key factors the analysis considers when determining if an off-base unit is acceptable includes rental cost, size, number of bedrooms and proximity to the base. Data was gathered this last winter for a revised analysis that may change our total housing authorized units. However, the results of the survey are not expected for a few more months.

As you are aware, military family housing construction projects are now underway that will provide 76 new homes for junior NCOs, 44 for company grade officers, 34 for field grade officers and two for senior officers over the next few years. Here is a summary of when and how many new housing units in various categories will be available, along with the number of older housing units scheduled for demolition (in italics):

Phase 1 (ready in June) — Field grade, six three-bedroom and two four-bedroom; company-grade, 40 three-bedroom and four four-bedroom.

Phase 2, Part 1 (ready in August) — Junior NCO, 24 three-bedroom.

Phase 2, Part 2 (ready in late 2004) — Senior officer, demolish two units in Lower T; company grade, demolish 28 units in Upper T.

Phase 2, Part 3 (ready in 2005) — Junior NCO, 12 three-bedroom.

Phase 3 (ready by 2005-2006) — Senior officer, two three-bedroom; field grade, 26 three-bedroom and demolish 24 units in Lower T; junior NCO, 14 three-bedroom.

Live from Iraq

Lajes broadcaster's journeys into Iraq transforms his views

On a long stretch of desert road somewhere between Baghdad and safety, Staff Sgt. Bret Reinhardt found himself handing out bottles of water to needy Iraqi citizens.

He also found himself changed.

This gesture of kindness wasn't written on to his orders nor was it part of his original tasking when assigned to the coalition media center in Doha, Qatar. In fact, for the broadcaster assigned to Det. 6, Air Force News Agency here, this mission came as a surprise.

"The colonel in charge of the media center grabbed me and said 'We need to send somebody up north,'" Reinhardt recalled. Eventually, because he had weapons training and he volunteered, he found himself part of a new mission.

Reinhardt had been paired with members of the State Department to film humanitarian relief actions going on even as the war raged farther north.

"The White House felt that the press coverage up to that point had been so negative," Reinhardt said, "that it wasn't focusing on a lot of the good

things the military was doing."

By March 30, Reinhardt found himself in Iraq. At that time, the brunt of the U.S. fighting effort was farther north. Reinhardt still saw the evidence of war — the pavement ripped from explosions and burned out hulks of cars, trucks and military fighting vehicles everywhere.

However, despite being away from the fighting, the war was just nine days old. Reinhardt said he was apprehensive about going "in country."

"We were going into an area that had been cleared," he said, "but you were never quite sure if someone was going to show up with a bomb on his chest and explode."

Reinhardt said his State Department team made several trips to Umm Qasr.

Their first excursions to record humanitarian relief efforts were somewhat fruitless, Reinhardt said, because many Iraqis didn't want to be videotaped.

"They were afraid members of the regime would show up and kill them," he said. "They were still afraid. They knew there might still be spies within their villages and neighborhoods who would report them."

Reinhardt said he spoke to an English-speaking Iraqi teacher, who reinforced what people were telling the broadcaster.

"He said 'all roads lead to death.' What he meant was that if they fought the Americans, they would die. But if they fought against the regime, someone would come and kill them. So, for them, all roads led to death," Reinhardt remembered.

With each stop, Reinhardt said he came to some realizations.

"You can't help but feel guilty. We have so much and are thankful for so little," he said. "They have so little but they're thankful for so much. Their lives are the opposite of our own."

Major Ken Sersun, the 65th Mission Support Squadron commander, also got to see Iraqi culture first hand



Deployment yields lessons, heartache

Major Ken Sersun said he learned more about the Air Force mission during his first-ever deployment as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom than at any point in his 16-year career.

While Reinhart was documenting some of the humanitarian actions that followed in the wake of fighting and chaos, Sersun's unit at Camp Virginia, Kuwait, was still prosecuting the war in areas all across Iraq.

As chief of staff for the Air Support Operations Center, Sersun was one of approximately 150 other bluesuiters amongst 10,000 of the V Corps' finest in the desert. The ASOC's role? Call in close air support for the troops on the ground. According to Sersun, that usually meant using pre-positioned "packages" of Air Force aircraft flying overhead, ready to drop bombs and kill the bad guys when needed.

These roaming hunters of A-10s, F-15s, F-16s, B-2 bombers and more, helped give the Air Force the edge in the war, Sersun said.

"We went to great lengths to win the war decisively and quickly, but we also went to great lengths not to minimize unnecessary death and destruction," he said. "We were not conquerors; we were liberators...and demonstrating this to the Iraqi people was crucial to winning their hearts and minds".

However, Sersun's portion of the war wasn't without its tragedy. Camp Virginia was nearby the site where an Army soldier allegedly tossed grenades into a command tent on March 22. Sersun was asked to write the posthumous award for Maj. Greg Stone, who died in a hospital in Kuwait 4 days later.

"Between that and diving into Scud bunkers, it brought the realization of death to the forefront," Sersun said.

Meanwhile, the deployment also helped the major better see "the big picture" of what the Air Force does.

"Doing what we did out there helped me prioritize what is truly important. It's also ensured I bring back to the office environment a renewed focus on the Air Force mission — to fly, fight — and win," he said. "Everything else in supports that mission."

during Operation Iraqi Freedom, though from a different location.

Although Sersun's role during the war was fixed more closely to the Air Force's "fly, fight — and win" motto, he understood Reinhart's sentiment.

"When you saw all these people, and how thankful they were — grabbing any supplies you had and that you could give them — we have an obligation to take care of those who are not able to defend themselves."

Reinhardt and the State Department team's final excursion followed a convoy of Kuwaiti humanitarian relief goods through As Samawah and eventually ending up in An Najaf, a town about 100 miles from Baghdad. Reinhardt said the team slept in its rental car. They didn't shower and ate ready-to-eat meals.

Reinhardt said even the Kuwaitis — whose country was invaded more than a decade beforehand — ensured everyone they met at stops along their

route received aid. At one point, rather than filming, Reinhardt found himself handing out bottled water by the pallet to needy citizens.

However, by the end of the trip, all had noticed a transformation of the people receiving the aid.

"At one point we were videotaping them and then letting them watch it on the camera. It was a huge source of entertainment for them," Reinhardt said. "We were getting mobbed by these women wanting to have their babies shown on video."

Like many who'd gone to war before him, Reinhardt said the experience transformed him.

"It's eye opening," the broadcaster said. "I don't think anybody could go there and not be changed in some way — not feel something. It does change you."

"If anything, you should appreciate what you have," he concluded. "You should appreciate your freedom. You should appreciate the cost."
