Rumsfeld visits Portugal

FORT SAO JULIAO, Portugal – Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld met with Portuguese Defense Minister Paulo Portas in Portugal Tuesday in advance of the NATO Defense Ministerial June 12.

Rumsfeld's arrival at the defense minister's official residence included the regular guard of honor. However, in addition, the Portuguese frigate Alvarez Cabral steamed past the 16th century fort with all its crew manning the rail. Portuguese officials said it was a way of highlighting the country's maritime heritage on its national holiday, Portugal Day. Rumsfeld thanked the Portuguese for their help in the global war on terrorism. (Jim Garamone, American Forces Press Service)

A statement of service already has Privacy Act information removed.

Rumsfeld clarifies civilian workforce proposal

THE PENTAGON — Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld cleared up some misconceptions about the proposed Department of Defense civilian personnel system during testimony before the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee June 4.

Rumsfeld said that the current system is not flexible and agile enough to confront the dangers of the 21st century.

Basically, he is asking Congress to approve a new way of hiring, rewarding, assigning and firing federal workers to meet these challenges.

The DOD has more than 730,000 civilian workers, and they are an important part of the department, he said.

Rumsfeld, Joint Chiefs chairman Gen. Richard Myers and Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vern Clarke emphasized that to transform the department, it must be allowed to transform the civilian workforce.

Rumsfeld spoke about what the new system will and will not do.

"It will not remove whistle-blowing protections," he told the senators. "Those

who report ... mismanagement, fraud (and) other abuses will have the same protections that they have today."

The system will not eliminate or alter employee protections available through the equal-employment-opportunity complaint process, nor will it in any way affect the rights of DOD employees under civil rights laws.

"Notwithstanding the allegations to the contrary, these proposals will not remove prohibitions on nepotism or political favoritism, as has been charged," he said. "Those things will properly continue to be prohibited."

The proposed changes will not eliminate veterans' preference, nor will they end collective bargaining.

"What it would do is bring collective bargaining to the national level, so that the department could negotiate with national unions, instead of dealing with more than 1,300 different union locals, a process that is inefficient," he said.

The proposed changes will not give the department a blank check to change the civil service system unilaterally, he said.

The new system would give the president a waiver that would allow him to give the department the flexibility to respond in the event national security requires the DOD to respond and act quickly.

The system will not result in the loss of job opportunities for civil-service employees, the secretary said.

"It's the current system that limits opportunities for DOD civilians," he said.

About 320,000 jobs that should be filled by civilian are done by military members. The secretary said this is because it is easier to manage servicemembers and contractors than civil servants.

"By creating perverse incentives for managers to give civilian tasks to the military personnel and to give civilian tasks to contractors, we believe the transforming initiatives would most likely generate more opportunities for DOD civilians, not less," Rumsfeld said.

"These (proposals) are based on personnel-management systems that Congress approved last year for homeland security and many years of experience with a number of successful congressionally authorized programs," he said. One pilot program — the Navy's China Lake experiment that tested pay banding — has been in operation for about 20 years.

"The pilot programs, which now involve more than 30,000 DOD employees, tested many of those reforms, including pay-banding systems, simplified job classifications, pay for performance, recruiting and staffing reforms and scholastic achievement appointments and enhanced training opportunities," he said. "When measured, employee satisfaction has been high, and the employers are retaining more of their top performers."

AF turns over spouse

INCIRLIK AB, Turkey — An Air Force wife has been turned over to U.S. marshals and returned to the United States following the death of her husband.

Latasha Lorraine Arnt was turned over to the custody of two U.S. marshals here June 1. She had been detained on base since May 27 in connection with the death of her husband, Staff Sgt. Matthias A. Arnt III, who died here at approximately 1:30 a.m. May 27.

The U.S. attorney's office for the Central District of California assumed jurisdiction of the case May 28 under the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act.

Arnt was formally indicted by the grand jury for the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California May 30.

Sign it! Date it! Check it!

Department of Defense travelers can help ensure their travel vouchers are paid promptly by preventing common mistakes, according to the Defense Finance and Accounting Service officials here.

Some of the biggest sources of delay are incorrect or incomplete information on travel vouchers, officials said. The most common errors include:

- No traveler's signature or date.
- No reviewer's signature.
- No orders attached.
- Blank, incomplete or erroneously filled out itinerary.
- Orders don't match itinerary dates or location.



Simplified travel-payment

The Air Force has automated the process of filing travel-accrual payment requests for military travelers, making it available on the Virtual Military Personnel Flight Web page.

According to officials, the result is better customer service for the traveler while reducing the workload for deployed financial services office workers and improving payment accountability for home-station offices.

The new secure Web-based process on vMPF lets travelers complete their worksheet when they want and on any computer with Internet access. The payment can be made to the traveler's account or to their government travel card as directed.

Officials adjust reenlistment bonuses

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas — Air Force officials recently revised reenlistment bonuses, adding or increasing 40 career field zones and decreasing or removing 100, according to Air Force Personnel Center officials.

The revision to the selective reenlistment bonus program includes additions of zones in two career fields that previously did not have a bonus. Also, 10 career fields that previously had some type of bonus were deleted from the revised list.

SRBs are authorized in 0.5 increments (or multiples) and in three reenlistment zones for people with between 17 months and 14 years of service.

The revised Air Force specialty code listing of SRB multipliers includes increases in 12 Zone-A (17 months to six years of service), 14 Zone-B (six to 10 years of service) and seven Zone-C (10 to 14 years of service)

career fields. It also includes additions in two Zone-A, four Zone-B and one Zone-C career field. Multipliers decreased in 38 Zone-A, 20 Zone-B and five Zone-C career fields.

Ten Zone-A, 15 Zone-B and 12 Zone-C SRBs were deleted; two AFSCs were added, and 10 were deleted in either Zones A, B, C or some combination.

Additions and multiple increases were effective June 4. The SRB multiple decreases and deletions are effective July 4.

college and a guaranteed job with the Defense Intelligence Agency.

Jason Pederson, an 18-year-old senior, applied for the scholarship at the prodding of his junior ROTC sergeant and will now receive an \$18,000-a-year stipend.

A student here for the past six years, Pederson said his fluent English and Korean language skills, extracurricular activities and academic standing helped him surpass his peers to capture the full-ride scholarship. His mother is Korean, and he has spoken Korean and English since childhood.

The DIA's Undergraduate Training Assistance Program requires Pederson to not only attend and pass courses in his pre-selected major, but also work a six-week internship at the DIA. Once he graduates with a bachelor of political science, he is required to fulfill a time-and-a-half commitment to the DIA. He hopes to graduate in four years, which will give him a six-year contract with the agency.

Pederson said his dependent status made him stand out in the selection process and gave him a working knowledge of the environment for his future job. The time he has spent in South Korea was another plus, he said.

Officials said Pederson's knowledge of the culture and people, as well as the language, made him a prime choice for the program that seeks minority students.

He plans to attend the University of South Florida in the fall, and said the tuition cap for the year will more than cover the university's tuition.

Safety: self-help discipline

Recently at a USAFE air base, two sons of Air Force members were seriously injured in a mishap that easily could have caused death.

These two boys were in a restricted construction area when they each picked up rebar rods and started throwing them like spears into a ditch. They didn't know about the electrical conduit at the bottom of the

trench that conveyed high-voltage power lines.

One of the rebar penetrated the conduit and the resulting discharge did four things: singed the boys' hair and eyebrows, injured one boy with 2nd and 3rd degree burns, took out most of that base's telephone switch, and caused complete network loss.

The injuries and havoc caused by this event pale in comparison to what might have been. If either boy had been touching the rebar when it was jabbed into the ditch, we would probably be reading about fatalities instead of injuries (and denial of mission-essential services).

Could this happen here?

We are witnessing unprecedented infrastructure and quality of life upgrades at Lajes. We need to be aware that housing construction, electrical power conversions, and

telephone upgrades present hazards — especially for children.

Parents, watch your children. Our contractors have worked hard with our civil engineering folks and resident officer-in-charge of construction to barricade construction sites and protect against unauthorized entry. This is a success story at Lajes.

Work areas are clearly marked, and barriers exist to keep the curious at a safe distance.

You can help prevent mishaps by getting involved. Safety is a self-help endeavor.

House builders can only go so far to keep unauthorized people away from the sharp edges, deep trenches, high walls, bare electrical wires and dangerous tools.

Do your part — remain vigilant, obey the rules and watch your children.

Air Force no place for racial slurs

American fads change all the time. And unfortunately, an alarming number of Air Force men and women are caught up using the "N word" as the dad of the Day.

Why? It's becoming popular slang on music compact discs and in the movies. It's also being used another way — to show love. Some people believe it's OK.

This racist epithet or ethnophaulism — the "N word" — is a symbolic representation because the word actually represents outrage, hatred and racism.

Air Force members can't use words like this. Such terms are the language of prejudice — verbal pictures of negative stereotypes.


The word carries hatred and repulsion directed toward blacks and African Americans. It is the ultimate American insult.

Its use can reflect loathing, even when the user is unaware of the psychological forces at play. It is the greatest expression of white racism and white superiority — regardless of the way it is pronounced.

People who use it are spreading a message of hate. It is the most commonly used racist slur during hate crimes.

Using the "N word" or any variation is not OK even if the user is in a minority. It belittles and rationalizes mistreatment.

The fact that some African Americans use the word and its variants has not significantly lessened its sting. Historically, this word captured the personal antipathy and institutionalized racism directed toward blacks. It still does.



The bottom line: racial epithets and slurs can impact Air Force morale and disrupts good order and discipline. The policy for military members and their families is simple — zero tolerance!

Hop aboard, see the Azores

Two ferryboats will travel among eight of the nine Azorean islands during the summer.

The first ferryboat, named "Golfinho Azul" (Blue Dolphin), is already sailing the Azorean waters and will operate through Sept. 30. The second boat, "Lady of Mann," will sail July 1- Sept. 28.

Golfinho Azul, property of an Azorean maritime company, can carry approximately 750 passengers and 120 vehicles. It also offers cabins for 240 passengers, a restaurant, two bars and a lounge. The "Lady of Mann" has less capacity, but can also transport vehicles.

These two boats offer a unique opportunity to travel to the other islands and also take your own vehicle or pets at an inexpensive cost.

"Lady of Mann" travels mostly among the central group of islands (Terceira,

Graciosa, São Jorge, Pico and Faial) although will also sporadically sail to Flores, São Miguel and Santa Maria. "Golfinho Azul" sails to all the islands, except Corvo. Both ferryboats will also offer additional special trips during the major festivals on the different islands.

Traveling by ferry can be a very pleasant experience, especially during the day among the central group of islands, since passengers will be able to observe breathtaking views of the islands while

they travel.

The ferries take about three hours to reach the island of Graciosa and six hours to reach São Jorge. Even though São Jorge is the closer island, the boats stop at Graciosa first before continuing on, which is why it takes longer to arrive at São Jorge.

From São Jorge, the ferries go on to the islands of Pico and Faial.

The total time for a trip between Terceira and Faial is about 10 hours. The boats also

take six hours to get to São Miguel and 15 hours to arrive at Flores.

During the longer trips, the boats sometimes feature entertainment, such as bands and movies to help pass time.

Tickets can be purchased at the commercial port of Praia one hour before departure time or at the travel agency "Turangra" at Rua da Artesia in Praia.

Round trip prices from the port of Praia range between 54.20 Euros (to any of the central group of islands) and 73.30 Euros, (to Flores). Children under 5 can travel for free and children between 5 and 11 have a 50-percent discount.

Program helps troops save money, eat healthy

Just about everybody would like to have a little more money in their pockets to help with extra expenses.

Maybe an extra \$100 or so to put away each month for their child's college education.

That's where Women, Infants and Children - Overseas can help.

It's an easy way for many families to save \$75-\$150 each month, according to Nora Blohm, WIC-O coordinator here.

Since WIC-O opened its doors here six months ago, about 160 participants from 90 families have signed up.

Blohm said there are many more families here who qualify for the program.

"I think the reason more people haven't taken advantage of the program is they think they don't qualify," she said. "A family of 4 — two parents and two children - can earn up to \$3,489 gross income each month and still qualify."

For example, a captain with six years in service and four children could potentially qualify. The same with a technical sergeant with 16 years in service and two children may also be eligible.

Cost of living allowances, basic allowances for housing and travel allowances are among the many benefits that are not included in the total family income to determine WIC-O eligibility.

Eligible participants include pregnant and breast-feeding women and infants and children up to the age of 5. Income and nutritional needs are two other key factors for eligibility, she explained.

Blohm said 81 percent of the eligible American population and 45 percent of all infants born in the United States use WIC.

WIC officials estimate 42,000 people overseas are eligible for WIC services.

"In addition to the vouchers for food, the parent or parents receive nutritional counseling," she said. "I've always felt good to know that I can help families with nutrition education and help put a few dollars back in their pockets."

Blohm gets a lot of positive feedback from people like Cassandra Losoya who said she saves about \$70 each month for items she regularly purchases for her 6-month old daughter. She has used WIC with two of her three children.

"It makes a big difference," she said. "It's nice to have the extra money for other things."

Airmen here will soon be able to blast aliens, throw touchdowns and performing virtual reconnaissance missions thanks to an initiative by the command services team.

Ian Foster, community activities center director, said he wants to open the Lajes Xbox gaming room by the end of June. He's waiting for furniture and for workers to install the network connection to connect gamers to the world. Spangdahlem AB, Germany, was the first to open an "XBox room."

"This is a great idea services is bringing to life at Lajes," said Foster. "We've gone above and beyond for our people here to ensure they get the full experience."

Given an allotment of cash to get the center up and running, Foster and volunteers have handpicked furniture and painted the room to

provide gaming ambiance. Two fluorescent green X's shine against the room's black walls. Stylized video game characters adorn the walls as well, leading gamers into the fun.

Foster said there are no fees to play, but given the popularity of online gaming, there will probably be — at least initially — a wait.

"We'll have four systems, and we know this is going to take off like a rocket," he said. "We're excited about getting the room for our customers."

David Quinn, chief of the community activity function for USAFE, said he's proud of this effort to boost morale and enhance quality of life for the troops.

"The real strength of the inter-connectivity with Internet gaming is programming. Once established, squadrons could be playing squadrons from other bases or even deployed folks playing against their home squadron, family and friends back home!" he said.
