I'm proud to be from the greatest nation on the face of the planet. I'm proud to wear the uniform of the most *respected* and *feared* Air Force in the world. I'm proud to be a West Virginia University Mountaineer. I'm proud of flying 480 knots. And, I'm proud that I know how to use a slide rule! We are a blessed nation and have a lot to be proud of: our homes, our families and our favorite sports teams.

Now being too proud can get you into trouble — you don't want to be arrogant. But if you're proud of something you want to show it off. It's waxing your car, getting spruced-up for a date or taking care of your front yard. Having pride

means you care. It's wearing a crisp uniform with shined shoes. It means being on time and keeping your promises. It means taking care of yourself and your things.

Having pride in what you do and who you are translates into tangible results. You can see it in yourself and so can others. It's contagious. It's a mindset. But, it requires some effort. ## Some airmen will deploy longer

### AF determines certain troops in AEF Blue will stay longer

WASHINGTON -- Air Force officials have determined that some airmen in Air and Space Expeditionary Force Blue will remain deployed longer than the scheduled 120 days.

Blue is the first of two transitional AEFs designed to bring the schedule back to a normal rotation. Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom forced the service into a contingency mode, breaking the normal steady-state deployment schedule.

Members of AEF Blue deployed in July for a scheduled 120 days. Airmen assigned to AEF Silver are set to replace Blue in November. Officials expect the deployment schedule to be back

on track by March.

About 22,000 airmen are deployed for AEF Blue -- about one in 10 will remain deployed longer than others, according to Maj. Gen. Timothy A. Peppe, special assistant for AEF matters at the Pentagon.

"Those folks are in what we term our stressed career fields," Peppe said. "About 2,300 people may be gone longer than 120 days.

"Primarily it is security forces who are extended," he said. "Some of the others may include air traffic control, civil engineering, services, medical and intelligence personnel."

Currently, AEF Center officials at Langley Air Force Base, Va., are working with combatant commanders and their Air Force components to size AEF Silver, the general said. Requirements are now just above 17,000, with more work to be done.

The general acknowledged the extra effort, but pointed out the purpose of the two AEFs is to put the Air Force back into the regular "battle rhythm."

The Air Force battle rhythm was designed to provide continuity and predictability to the airmen who support Air Force steady-state commitments around the globe. Such commitments would have included operations like Operation Northern Watch, but could be used to provide Air Force capability wherever it is needed, Peppe said.

In January, AEF 7 and AEF 8 airmen were actively supporting Air Force commitments around the globe. When it became clear there was need for a force buildup to support operations in Iraq, the Air Force "froze" them in place, effectively making their return-home date indefinite. As

operational needs increased, the Air Force tapped into more AEFs, taking from each successive force package only what was needed, Peppe said. By the time it was all over, every AEF had been affected to some degree.

"We literally had some people from every AEF deployed (to) Iraq in some capacity," Peppe said. "We ended up deploying about 50,000 (airmen) and identified another 60,000 who could have gone."

Those airmen identified to support earlier operations, but who never actually deployed, are manning AEF Silver.

It is the remaining 60,000 "could-have-gone" airmen who were assigned to Blue and Silver. When AEF Silver's scheduled deployment ends, airmen assigned to AEF 7 and AEF 8 will be vulnerable for deployment as the Air Force re-establishes its battle rhythm.

"An AEF is built to be used for whatever the nation asks it to do," Peppe said. "It can be for an exercise, a contingency or a full-up war. It can be used for anything."



### T-bird crashes in Idaho

### AFA meeting underway

WASHINGTON -- The 2003 Air Force Association convention began Monday including a gathering of more than 90 global air chiefs from around the world.

Honor guardsmen posted flags from each nation represented at the convention, visually reinforcing the global nature of the annual gathering. The Global Air Chiefs Conference is being held concurrently with the AFA convention. The theme of this year's convention is "Up From Kitty Hawk, 100 Years of Powered Flight."

The theme drives home the relevance of accomplishments of the Wright Brothers, who "foresaw the important military applications of flight," said John J. Politi, AFA chairman of the board.

The Air Force chief of staff, Gen. John P. Jumper, welcomed the attendees on behalf of the U.S. Air Force. (Air Force Print News)

## Working toward zero DUIs

### USAFE commits to random vehicle check to stop drunk driving

**(Editors note:** *In the near future, security forces personnel at U.S. Air Forces in Europe main operating bases will be conducting random vehicle checks intended to demonstrate USAFE's serious commitment to reducing the number of DUI incidents occurring within the command. This fictitious, yet realistic, scenario is presented to help educate USAFE professionals on a military commander's right to perform random vehicle inspections on military installations for the greater safety of its personnel, and to help in the deterrence of senseless DUI incidents.*)

Rolling down the window, I spoke as calmly as possible to the young woman wearing the M-16 and the beret "Hmmm . . . good evening officer, is there something wrong?"

Standing somewhat rigidly, the security forces member responded, "No, sir, nothing wrong; you've just been tagged to participate in our anti-DUI campaign—every fifth car gets pulled over. Please step out of the car so we can administer the field sobriety test."

Remaining seated for just a moment, I innocently inquired, "Does it make a difference that I told my son, Jake, I would be picking him up exactly at 6:30 p.m., so we can watch Terminator at the theater." Hopefully, she is a fan of Arnold Schwarzenegger . . .

Unmoving, Staff Sgt. Smith replied, "Yes, it makes a difference; now please step out of the car."

Sensing a contradiction, and hoping for the slightest tremor of waiver, I gestured with the palm of my left hand and pleaded, "Wait a moment, I heard you just say that Jake makes a difference . . . can I go now?"

With a rather convincing absence of

waiver, she spoke, "Sir, your son makes a difference. Now please step out of the car and I will attempt to quickly conduct the field sobriety test. This usually takes less than one minute."

It was a hot day. After mowing and raking the lawn, I really deserved those two cold German beers while catching some shade on the porch. There is simply no justice if I get slammed for mowing and raking and then relaxing a little bit. Hey, I took American History in school; I know a little bit about justice . . .

"Staff Sgt. Smith, do you know that under the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, we are protected against unreasonable searches and seizures?"

With surprising patience and clarity, Smith replied, "Glad that you mentioned the Fourth Amendment . . . we discussed

that at guard mount today in preparation for this detail. As it turns out, the United States Supreme Court in a Michigan case (Michigan State Police v. Sitz, 496 U.S. 444, 1990) ruled that sobriety checkpoints are not unreasonable seizures since we have such a strong public interest in reducing the number of alcohol related deaths. Now, please dismount your vehicle so we can conduct the test. We don't want to keep Jake waiting."

Jeez, what could be worse than a courteous, knowledgeable and efficient security forces member? And where does this, dismount your vehicle language come from? Did she enlist in the cavalry? Anyway, this is not Michigan, this is the military.

Summoning my deepest, most persuasive voice, I replied, "Staff Sgt. Smith, if this were Michigan, I would certainly agree with you. However, we are in the U.S. Air Force and we have entirely different rules under the Uniform Code of Military Justice."

Displaying far more serenity than I could have mustered, she quickly replied, "You are correct, our military justice system does differ in some respects from the civilian system. The military can make rules that are more restrictive on law enforcement activities than those imposed in the civilian community. But we haven't done that in this case. In fact, military commanders are charged with the additional obligation to provide for security on their installations and, as a result, there are special provisions specifically permitting inspections and gate searches." (See United States v. Harris, 5 M.J. 44; United States v. Jones, 24 M.J. 294; and Military Rules of Evidence, Rule 313(b)).

"Sergeant Smith, prior to conducting the field sobriety test, do you mind if I call Jake on my handy? I suspect he will be walking home tonight."

# Spider spider on the wall ...

**Question: I've noticed some pretty large black, yellow spiders around our house. Are they dangerous to humans?**


The spiders you've noticed around the house are actually black and yellow Argiopes or "Garden/banana spiders" like the Americans call them, and I understand they are also very common in North America.

The people of Terceira call them "aranhas venenosas," which literally means "poisonous spiders," but according to Dr. Eduardo Dias of the University of the Azores' Department of Biology, they aren't dangerous to humans.

They do have neurotoxin venom similar to that of the black widow spiders which is released when attacking other insects or defending themselves. This could be fatal to insects but not to humans.

However, if a human is bitten by one of these spiders, they could experience some allergies, pain, redness and swelling in the area of the bite, which may require medical assistance.

Still, according to Dr. Dias, the symptoms may vary from person to person, depending on each individual's

capacity to react to the bite – just like when a person is stung by a bee.

These spiders can be observed on the island throughout the year in gardens and other areas with vegetation, but they seem to be most common during the fall months.

good, well-developed plan of action. Whether it's a test, an interview, a deployment or a sortie, you have to lay the groundwork beforehand. If you take pride in what you do, you'll prepare ahead of time.

**Respect.** Give yourself credit. Nine times out of ten you'll meet your own level of expectations — both high and low. You've got to think enough of yourself to know you can accomplish anything you set your mind to. Setting high standards for yourself is about self-respect. Similarly, treating others the way you want to be treated is about mutual respect. We don't do much in life without help from others. You're part of a team — treat your teammates right. If you take pride in what you do, you'll respect yourself and those around you.

**Integrity.** You are only as good as your word. Protect it. Have the courage to say what you mean and mean what you say. You're the one who has to look in the mirror. Make sure what you do can stand up in daylight. There's nothing worth losing the trust others

have placed in you. If you take pride in what you do, your integrity will be rock solid.

**Discipline.** A good plan is useless unless you execute it — you have to follow through. You've got to be willing to put in the hard work that translates your vision into reality. Most of us make a list of New Year's resolutions, but few of us actually stick to them. It's determination that's the difference between what you say and what you do. If you take pride in what you do, you'll have the discipline to stay on course.

**Enthusiasm.** You've got to be excited about what you do! If you're not, then you probably ought to find something else to do. The way you approach a task determines the outcome. Now you've got to be smart and pace yourself. Full speed ahead isn't always appropriate — we don't need all speed and no vector. I know we spend a lot of time away from home and family, but if you keep your chin up and maintain a positive attitude, you'll be happier, healthier and more productive. If you take pride in what you do, you'll tackle every job with enthusiasm and high energy.

These five PRIDE traits are not only good for us individually, but should also drive what we do collectively in the command. Together we can showcase the PRIDE we have in U. S. Air Forces in Europe. One of the most visible signals of that pride is the appearance of our bases.

There's a theory in law enforcement that says if you replace the broken windows in high crime neighborhoods, then the crime rates drop. I'm told it's been put to the test and worked in big cities like New York, N.Y. and Los Angeles, Calif. It suggests that people react to the outward appearance of a place and adjust their behavior and expectations accordingly.

That makes sense to me. If things look good on the outside, they'll look good on the inside. For good or bad, you usually can judge a book by its cover. For us, outward appearance is a window to the inner workings of our units' organizational efficiency and attention to detail. Pride in appearance spills over into pride in work, mission accomplishment, esprit-de-corps and customer satisfaction. We're going to

put that theory to work for us.

COMBAT PROUD is our initiative in USAFE to make sure our bases look the way they should. This is a command issue — commanders and supervisors are being asked to be "hands on"; ensuring their areas meet our standards. We're also working with the base civil engineers, but they're not solely responsible — everyone has a role to play. You can help by working with Self-Help, partnering with your local CE, and taking some ownership. That means you have to get out and police up your buildings. You may find yourself on a weekend detail putting up a new fence, planting new shrubs, picking up trash or painting new parking stripes. Your base leadership will be right there with you.

Look with a sharp eye and you'll see what needs fixing. Don't forget, these are our homes away from home. Let's give our bases the attention they deserve — we owe it to ourselves, to our teammates and to the Air Force — that's how we'll get the PRIDE results!

# Helping the futures market

## *Cop heads home to help 'at risk' children find the right path*

While many take a permissive temporary duty assignment to go house hunting, Senior Airman Dan Magas went home to do another kind of hunting.

Magas, a security controller with the 65th Security Forces Squadron, sought to help about 70 children in the Pennsylvania State Police's Camp Cadet at Clarion University program get on the right path with their lives.

Magas and an Army senior NCO served as drill instructors for the one-week course in Clarion, Pa. Donning his battle-dress uniform and his beret, Magas admitted that the experience for the children ranging in age from 12-16 was much like Air Force basic training.

"The first part of the week, we break them down and then we built them back up again," Magas said. "We aren't the

good guys at camp. That's what the troopers are there for -- at least until the end of the week."

Magas' knowledge of the program -- that includes marching, classes, physical training and more -- isn't just as the hollering DI pounding trash cans at 4 a.m. When he was 13, his grandfather, a retired state trooper, sent him through the program.

"I really didn't have a choice," Magas said. "He just wanted me to see what it was like."

After that, Magas got hooked. He served as a counselor in the program in all of his teen-aged years and has attended — on his own dime — to act as drill instructor almost every year he's been in the service.

Meanwhile, the senior airman's work hasn't gone unnoticed. First Lt. Lee Hoisington, 65th SFS operations officer commander, said it's people like Magas who epitomize the kind of selflessness and

sacrifice bluesuiters are willing to provide to the community.

"It's an example of what the Air Force is striving for -- giving back to the community and to the Air Force itself. He's definitely gone above the norm," he said.

While he pays his way to get back to his hometown and be part of the program, Magas said the rewards for having an effect on those 70 lives are priceless.

"When you're out at a mall and one of the kids walks by, smiles and says, 'Hey Sergeant Dan!' then you know you've made a big difference in their lives," he said.

Magas said he wants to become a Pennsylvania state trooper when his enlistment ends. He wants this so he can stay involved in the Camp Cadet program and help more children get a good start on life.

## **Chiefs talk air power in Washington summit**

WASHINGTON -- More than 90 air power leaders from around the world convened here to interact with each other, members of Congress, national dignitaries, industry leaders and diplomats.

The last Global Air Chiefs Conference, held in Las Vegas in 1997, was during the Air Force's 50th anniversary. This year's conference was called in

recognition of the 100th anniversary of powered flight, said forum moderator Willard H. Mitchell, former deputy undersecretary of the Air Force for international affairs.

First to address the air chiefs was Air Marshal Jonah Domfa Wuyep, the air staff chief for the Nigerian air force. He provided an African perspective on security cooperation. Wuyep's said that Africa may be the "weakest link" in the war on terrorism.

"The basic reason for Africa being the weakest link is that there is a lack of capacity in most countries' militaries to effectively contribute more than men to any peacekeeping operations," Wuyep said.

Even then, Wuyep said, African nations often lack an ability to provide those men with proper military training. He asked that larger military nations be more aware of the fact.

Wuyep also addressed the emergence of multilateralism

after the fall of the Soviet Union.

"The disappearance of the Soviet Union as a superpower and the emergence of many sovereign states gave a flip to the shift toward multilateralism in world affairs," he said.

The 1991 Gulf War, the Balkans and East Timor are examples of successes achieved by multilateral partnerships, according to Wuyep.


