DOD nabs AF translator for espionage

WASHINGTON -- The Defense Department is continuing its investigations into two cases associated with the confinement facility at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, in which an Air Force translator is charged with espionage and an Army chaplain is being held pending charges.

Raul Duany, spokesman for U.S. Southern Command, said the military has no information at this time that the two cases are connected.

Both cases involve servicemembers assigned to Camp Delta on U.S. Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, where the United States is detaining suspected al-Qaida and Taliban members.

Survey lets airmen share viewpoints

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas – Lajes people will soon be able to share their viewpoints on how their leaders and organizations are doing by participating in the 2003 Air Force Climate Survey.

The online survey, which kicks off Oct. 1 and runs through Nov. 23, is one of the best ways for Air Force government employees to share their concerns about their organizational climate and participation in the survey is critical, said senior leaders.

"Leadership must be made aware of what's really going on out there," said Secretary of the Air Force Dr. James G. Roche. "By taking a few brief moments to fill out this survey, you can help your leaders understand your concerns and, ultimately, better serve you and our nation's interests."

Previous surveys included active-duty airmen and appropriated-fund civilians. This year, the survey also will include the Reserve, Guard, non-appropriated fund civilians and students in a temporary-duty status.

"The survey allows people to share their

personal views on areas for improvement at the organizational, command and Air Force levels," said Capt. Amy Moore, U.S. Air Forces in Europe Manpower Performance Management section chief and USAFE primary point of contact for the survey.

The 2003 survey will cover 13 factors that measure work experience: job, resources, core values, leadership, supervision, training and development, teamwork, participation and involvement, recognition, unit flexibility, general satisfaction, unit performance outcomes and job enhancement.

Survey participation has climbed from 39 percent in 1997 and 36 percent in 1999 to more than 65 percent of active-duty airmen and civilians in the 2002 survey.

Survey results will be released early in 2004.

Bosnia peace 'brittle'

EAGLE BASE, Bosnia – The military jobs mandated by 1995's Dayton Accords are just about completed, but stability in Bosnia is "brittle" and still requires the Stabilization Force, military officials here said.

Joint Chiefs Chairman Air Force Gen. Richard B. Myers toured Eagle Base and Camp McGovern Sept. 18. He met with Stabilization Force commander Army Lt. Gen. William Ward and with the American contingent commander, Army Brig. Gen. Ron Mason.

Mason, commander of the Multinational Brigade (North) and a National Guardsman from the 35th Infantry Division, said the apparent stability in Bosnia is superficial. "There are deep-seated feelings here," he said. He said there is a commitment to peace, but it is tenuous and could easily die.

"They need to develop the civilian capabilities that would make this stability continue on its own," Mason said. (American Forces Press Service)

Contractors upgrade ILS

Replacing old cables, antenna and distribution units on crucial navigation equipment here will help flyers worldwide and will bolster Lajes capability to enable expeditionary forces across the globe.

Contractors from the Science Applications International Corporation are replacing 28 antennas and two radio frequency radiation distribution units on the instrument landing system equipment on Lajes' runway, according to Master Sgt. Tim Ray, 65th Communications Squadron. SAIC is based in San Diego.

Replacing the equipment was necessary, Ray said, because parts for the old gear were no longer available. Further, he said, cabling that transmits information

from the ILS shelter to the antenna array had become unreliable when extreme hot and cold weather played a role.

"The system will be much more stable than the old," he said. "We weren't able to get parts for the old equipment. Plus, the weather will no longer affect how flyers are seeing our runway."

The \$70,000 project started Sept. 5 on runway 15. A Federal Aviation Administration team from Oklahoma City, Okla., flying a C-21 from Ramstein flew 26 "runs" on the equipment's "localizer," and six to check runway 15's glide slope equipment. Ray said it all checked out and work was completed on Sept. 18.

Contractors are now focusing on runway 33. Work started Sept. 19. The FAA team is expected to return Oct. 1 to test installation of the runway 33 gear.

SOUTHWEST ASIA -- By 8:43 p.m. the KC-135 Stratotanker was well on its way to the sky over Iraq from its forward-deployed location. This mission is just one of many combat tanker missions that take place every day in the U. S. Central Command area of responsibility.

Sure, one might say that a KC-135 is not really a combat aircraft, but fighters, bombers or any other plane would be unable to complete a single mission without the fuel the tankers provide.

Barcoding should speed deployments

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas - A new technology, similar to what grocery aisle workers use to inventory store shelves, may soon eliminate long in-processing lines at deployed sites.

The handheld scanner initiative currently being tested allows personnel support team members to scan ID cards of military members as they get off the aircraft arriving at a deployed location, reducing waiting time from hours to minutes.

This initiative will enable combatant commanders to ac-

count for the whereabouts of each deployed person in 'real time,' according to Col. Bruce Lovely, chief of the personnel readiness division here.

"This system will help ensure the right people - with the right experience and specialties - are at the right place, at the right time for mission accomplishment," said Colonel Lovely.

The scanner, officially known by the acronym BATMAN, can read the two-dimensional barcode on the front of the common access card, or the one-dimensional barcode on the back. The system can also read the old green or red

ID cards, ensuring 100 percent accountability no matter what ID card someone may deploy with, according to Ms. Rosemary Flores, a program manager with the project.

Recently, a two-man PERSCO team used the scanners to process 250 people in 20 minutes for the exercise Ulchi Focus Lens in Korea.

"The results of the test in Korea speak for themselves and the overwhelming advantages of the scanner-based in-processing method are clear - saving time, manpower and material," said Flores.

With the success of additional field-testing in Germany;

plans have already been made to take the scanner to Southwest Asia for more tests.

"We think the testing in SWA will show the scanners are capable of operating in a harsh environment while minimizing processing time and getting the troops quickly to the fight," Lovely said. "Besides saving valuable time for deployed [Personnel Support for Contingency Operations] team members, we're also examining ways to utilize and integrate scanner technology into all aspects of agile combat support."

The system is tentatively scheduled to become operational as early as fall of 2004.

see what I saw, perhaps they would have a different point of view.

I can tell you one thing: When you are 32,000 feet high in the sky over Iraq, there is no "quagmire" to find, or even hostile fire. There are just stars shining over a country that is free of Saddam Hussein's rule for the first time in more than 35 years.

As I sat buckled in the cockpit, minimal lights on in the plane, cruising to our designated rendezvous point that night, all I could think about was the 140,000-plus American troops beneath me doing whatever they can to help the Iraqi people. It really sort of made my lofty position above them seem so insignificant. Soon though, I would see my comrades in action.

10:52 p.m. -- We descended to cruise at a comfortable level between 22,000 and 28,000 feet and waited for the E-8C. Soon it was in trail behind the tanker.

The E-8C took the fuel in two intervals. First it took 35,000 pounds of fuel in one go-

around and then another 10,000 pounds in the final offload. Senior Airman Cy Eckhardt, the boom operator on the flight, performed this refueling job under very low light conditions to protect the night vision of the pilot of the receiving aircraft. Eckhardt worked like a cat in the night with quickness and precision. Before I knew it, the E-8C was refueled and on its way.

I remember telling Eckhardt as the E-8C approached for the second time, "You've got a great job. Where else on this planet would you be able to do something like this?"

He replied jokingly, "Singapore." Singapore is one of a handful of other countries that have air-refueling capabilities close to those of the U.S. Air Force.

Meanwhile, the pilot, Capt. Joel Rivard also from Grand Forks AFB, and co-pilot, 1st Lt. William Jimenez from McConnell AFB, Kan., kept the plane steady during the refueling. They were the epitome of good "crew resource management," minimizing the risk of any mishap with the other aircraft. When you have

refueling involved, a small miscue by either side could be a costly one in terms of life and death.

Flying steady and straight is one, if not the most important thing during a refueling. However, I think if you were to ask Eckhardt, he would probably say the pilot and co-pilot were just "driving him to work."

So we waited for them to "drive" him to his next refueling job, a pair of A-10s.

12:10 a.m. -- I was nearly asleep when Eckhardt told me the A-10s would be refueling in about 10 minutes. So, like a good little observer, I got ready and headed to the back to watch the action.

As the KC-135 decelerated to accommodate the A-10's slower speed, Eckhardt connected with the first at 12:17 a.m. He started refueling and talking to the pilot of the A-10, who asked him where he was from. I could hear a loud "Grand Forks" over the aircraft noise.
