USAFE Liberia mission a success

More than 300 people from U.S. Air Forces in Europe returned from supporting a safe and effective operation for Joint Task Force Liberia recently.

USAFE members were called to be a part of a joint team July 13 that was forged to stem violence and allow food to be distributed after fighting flared up among groups vying for power in Liberia, Africa.

Gen. Robert "Doc" Foglesong, USAFE commander, reflected on the selfless sacrifice and dedication of USAFE airmen during the past three months in JTF-Liberia.

"Our airmen demonstrated courage, leadership and the agility to get the mission done," he said. "I am very proud to be associated with everyone who made this operation succeed. For those who deployed-and their families-thanks for your commitment and service."

Although not specifically directed at American citizens or interests, the violence around the capitol city of Monrovia threatened to spill over onto U.S. Embassy grounds.

USAFE's role was extensive according to Col. Bob Steel, USAFE Theater Air and Space Center commander.

"Nothing would be possible without the talents of our expeditionary units," he said. "On short notice they

Meeting discusses birthing options

Prenatal and delivery care as well as child birth options were highlighted in a town-hall meeting Oct. 2 in the chapel.

Lt.Col. Katherine Callies, 65th Medical Operations Squadron, said the goals for the meeting were threefold.

First, Callies said the group needed to find out what the Lajes community's concerns were. Due to eliminated positions and funding cuts, she said the group is looking into the island community for more options.

"If we don't know what the community's concerns are, we can't address them," she said. Callies said the medical group also needs to know what resources the community is interested in.

"We need to know what they see as possible fixes," she said. "For instance, information on breastfeeding, post-partum issues and community support for childcare."

Finally, she said they were looking for volunteers to help the Obstetrics Steering Committee make these things happen. Committee membership includes representatives from the medical group, Family Support Center, First Shirts As-

sociation, and Enlisted and Officers' Spouses Groups.

Some concerns with care in Angra were the lack of epidural use, communication barriers, restriction on spouse visitation and differences in care. However, Callies said different doesn't necessarily mean not as good.

"The neonatal death rates in Portugal are lower than in the U.S." she said. "They have to be doing something right."

But for others, the options stork nesting provides are better.

"I had concerns with the medi-

cal care and the lack of pain relief," said Katie Hagan. "(stateside) I still had a couple things go wrong, but my family was there."

Stork nesting has its own set of concerns, Callies said. For instance, the mother will be separated for a significant amount of time - at least eight weeks away - due to flight concerns, birth and wait time for the baby's paperwork. Also, the medical staff at the U.S. location won't be as familiar with the mother's case.

Either choice comes with its own set of stresses, Callies said, but

she says birthing on-island has been a great experience for many.

"I know several families who've had not one, but two children here," she said.

Stork nesting also offers dependent wives the option of returning to the state of their choice and making arrangements for care at that location. Tricare assists with finding a provider there. The only drawback is the possibility of the husband not arriving in time for delivery due to travel arrangements.

Lori Mulhern had her son Nolan in a hospital near her parents' house in Pittsburgh, PA. through this option. She said it was difficult to be away from home while preparing for the new addition to their family. Nolan said she wanted the security of giving birth in a state-side hospital in case of complications - being a registered nurse, she was more familiar and comfortable with the procedures and care available there.

"There's a cultural difference between being a patient in an American hospital and a patient in a Portuguese hospital," she said. "The truth is most women have a positive birthing experience in Angra Hospital."

Airmen review records online

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — The Air Force has started a new program allowing airmen to complete record reviews online through the virtual military personnel flight.

Airmen will soon begin receiving e-mail notifications around their birthday each year advising them to review their electronic personnel records maintained in the military personnel data system.

"After the customer logs on to vMPF and accomplishes his or her record review, a hard copy should be printed for the member's personal records," said Master Sgt. Don Taylor. He is the superintendent of customer support operations at the Air Force Personnel Center here. "If all of the information is correct, no further action is required until the next annual review."

In some areas where airmen may find errors, they can make the needed changes through the links provided. They should

make the corrections as soon as they discover them, Taylor said.

Other errors not yet updateable online can be corrected by the airman's MPF or commander's support staff.

AF Climate Survey kicks off

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — People have the power to change the future when they complete the 2003 Air Force Climate Survey. It launched Oct. 1.

"Speak Today, Shape Tomorrow" is a great message for all of us," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force Gerald Murray. "I strongly encourage you to participate in this survey. I hope you support this effort, because with this data, we can make this great Air Force of ours better. Together, we can shape tomorrow for the Air Force, our people and our families."

The survey, offered every two years since 1997, measures how people feel about leadership, supervision, training, recognition and other aspects of Air Force organizations.

Previous surveys included active-duty officers and enlisted airmen, as well as appropriated-fund civilians. This year, the survey also will include the Air Force Reserve Command, Air National Guard, nonappropriated-fund civilians and students in a temporary-duty status.

Commission accredits high school; elementary school awaits results

A national organization created to ensure schools have "high quality standards" and are improving student performance granted accreditation the high school Tuesday as the elementary faculty awaited results.

The North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement accredited the Lajes High School. Results were forthcoming from the elementary school at press time, which were due Thursday afternoon.

The commission is a non-governmental, voluntary organization that accredits more than 9,000 public and private schools in 19 states, the Navajo Nation, and the Department of Defense Dependents' Schools worldwide.

Susan Simmons, vice principal for the high school, said the commission's accreditation process is a valuable one that not only means high standards are being met, but keeps the school on course for improvement.

"Our school faculty and administration has been happy to see in-

To earn the commission's accreditation, Lajes High School had to:

1. Meet the commission's quality standard and criteria. "The standard and criteria require a broad and rigorous curriculum, highly qualified staff, appropriate pupil-teacher ratios, safe and secure facilities, and other components necessary to provide a quality education," ..
2. Implement a school improvement plan focused on increasing student performance.
3. Host at least two peer review/evaluation visits during the school improvement cycle.
4. Document the results of their school improvement efforts.

volvement of our students and parents in various in-service training opportunities," she said. "We appreciate our military command's support as well. The entire Lajes community can take pride in its schools' accreditation as an important stamp of approval for another five years."

Visiting the school Wednesday, Assistant Superintendent of Isles District Schools Gary Gerstner said the value of the accreditation and the value of the partnership the school has with parents could not be understated.

"It's a validation," he said. "We

have four goals; one of those is partnership. This accreditation process is part of that. We would not have done well without that partnership process that helps us move forward by involving all the key folks."

Students notice the faculty's vigor, too. Sophomore Josh Wright wasn't familiar with the accreditation process, but understood his teachers meant business.

"I never really paid attention in English," he said, "but here, they make me pay attention."

Meanwhile, as of press time, elementary school principal Ray Szczepaniak awaited the results of

the commission's findings at his school. Part of the elementary school's five-year plan focused on student's inquiry skills and ability to solve problems. The 22-year educator within Department of Defense Schools said the plan was on track.

"We wanted the plan to be about the way we do business. Our teachers are very committed to teaching these skills and implementing the plan," Szczepaniak said. "Our mission is life long learning. These inquiry skills we're teaching students to learn — asking questions and having them finding out the answers — are skills they will use their whole life. The accreditation team will help validate that."

For parents and students, the message the elementary school principal said he wants to send is simple: we are moving forward and doing it right.

"School isn't a random set of happenings. We have a plan with the children's best interests in mind. We're working hard to achieve that plan and we're working together," he said.

to the maximum extent.

Eagle Flag is to the expeditionary combat-support community what Red Flag is to the fighter community, said Maj. Gen. Christopher A. Kelly, Air Mobility Warfare Center commander at Fort Dix, N.J.

"(It) will bring expeditionary combat-support leadership to Fort Dix (where) we will test their abilities to go out and establish an air base in an austere location," he said.

Because this is the inaugural Eagle Flag exercise, "there are a lot of unknowns," Kelly said. "The primary objective will be to test the team that will come together ... in an expeditionary role (to establish) an air base and to give us a good, solid foundation ... for follow-on Eagle Flag exercises."

To accomplish these objectives, center planners will draw from expeditionary combat-support specialties throughout the Air Force. Units attending Eagle Flag will be scheduled like actual deployments, through the Air and Space Expeditionary Force Cen-

ter at Langley Air Force Base, Va.

In the past, Air Mobility Command officials focused on the command's own combat-support specialties in a similar exercise called Phoenix Readiness. However, the Air Force did not have a service-level training environment that all major commands could tap into.

"The Air Force recognized that Phoenix Readiness provided a good foundation and a good way to transition from that major-command-focused expeditionary combat-support experience to a larger Air Force focus," Kelly said.

Using Phoenix Readiness as the foundation for Eagle Flag has allowed Air Force officials to get this exercise off the ground sooner than if it had to be built from scratch.

DFAS caution certain sites

ARLINGTON, Va. — Officials here

caution the 2 million military and civilian users of myPay to use only the official Web site when accessing pay account information.

"Personal information is valuable and should be safeguarded," said Claudia L. Bogard, director of corporate communications for the Defense Finance and Accounting Service. "Don't provide your personal information to any Web site unless you know it can be trusted."

Look-alike sites have recently frustrated myPay customers who have been confused by accidentally finding their way to a commercial site that is in no way affiliated with DFAS or the Department of Defense.

MyPay is a secure, DFAS-operated Web site that lets active-duty, National Guard and Reserve servicemembers, civilian employees, and military retirees and annuitants take charge of their pay accounts online. The DFAS myPay Web site is found at <https://mypay.dfas.mil/>. (AFPN)

Store undergoes changes

\$3.8M will build new deli, bakery, other renovations

With new management and nearly \$4 million from congress, the commissary is undergoing changes to help make shopping easier and more convenient for Lajes customers.

John Nelson, the new store director for the Lajes Commissary, and Churdri Najdawi, the new store administrator, have been working on some changes to improve the quality of service at the commissary, and the first thing to change are the hours.

"As a store director for the Defense Commissary Agency, I am very proud of the job I have been selected to do," Nelson said. "I see my primary responsibility as taking care of my customers."

Changes begin Monday with new hours. The commissaries new hours will be 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday; 10 a.m.-7 p.m. Thursdays and closed on Sundays.

"I think it's great that the commissary is open on Monday now, and the hours are a lot better," said Windy Torgerson, a commissary customer. "I don't have to rush when I get off work now. I will actually have time to do a little shopping instead of having to wait for the weekend."

In November, some remodeling is scheduled to begin at the commissary thanks to the \$3.8 million received from DeCA.

The money goes towards

freezers and coolers, a new meat display area, new chill and frozen cases in the store, an expanded bakery and deli and new lighting for the store, Nelson said.

"The store won't be closed for this project, and we will do all we can to ensure our customers are inconvenienced as little as possible," Nelson said. "The end product will be a much nicer store for our customers and employees."

The new deli will make custom-made sandwiches and have more selections to choose from

in the 'Grab 'n Go' section.

Other changes planned for the commissary include bringing in more produce, custom-made cakes, more food on the shelves and in the freezers and new floors.

"We are able to get daily deliveries of produce now, instead of once a week from Germany," Nelson said. "Much of it is produced locally, therefore it arrives to the store in a fresher condition."

Nelson said some produce will still have to be brought in from Lisbon on a weekly basis,

but for the most part, the produce section will be better

The bakery now provides custom-made cakes through the Army and Air Force Exchange Service in Germany. The cakes come in frozen and must be ordered at least two weeks in advance.

Nelson also plans to have more food brought in on a weekly basis to help keep the shelves and chilled items stocked.

Nelson said the commissary management is doing the best it can to make shopping better for the customer.

He added that the commissary is just not big enough to carry every item that customer's might want, but people can request special orders.

"We require at least two weeks advance notice and the customer has to purchase it by the case," Nelson said. "It's most helpful if the customer can provide the UPC code. That way we can find out right away if it is available to us."

Last year the commissary here has won Best Small Store for the U.K. Zone, Best Merchandising award for the U.K. Zone and they received an award for making it through one-year accident free.

"We hope these changes do make for a better total shopping experience," Nelson said. "The Lajes Commissary wants what is best for our customers and will do everything possible to achieve raving fans."

Did Columbus land here or not?

As the Americans are getting ready to celebrate Columbus Day, I would like to kill a rumor I have often heard: that Columbus stopped at Terceira Island while coming back from the New World.

Christopher Columbus and his crew found what they believed to be India. In reality, they discovered some islands in the Caribbean Sea. The Niña with Columbus in command and the Pinta began their homeward voyage in January 1493.

The two ships were forced to split due to a storm. The storm drove the Niña and Columbus to the Azorean island of Santa Maria. They supposedly arrived Feb. 15, 1493, while the Pinta found its way to Spain.

It had never been Columbus' intention to call at the Azores. He had carefully avoided all the Portuguese islands, but his ship and crew had suffered so much that he decided to take a chance in the hope of obtaining supplies and to get some rest.

Some Portuguese chroniclers say that Columbus and his crew stopped on Santa Maria to fulfill a vow. They made the vow on the high sea during the storm, promising to hear Mass at the nearest church of Our Lady on the first land they should

encounter. In fact, there's a small chapel located in the village of Anjos, on the northeast side of the island, where supposedly some Columbus men prayed and celebrated mass.

According to Silvio A. Bedini's Christopher Columbus Encyclopedia, a small group of Columbus men were attending mass when they were taken prisoners by a group of local villagers acting under the orders of the island's captain, João de Castanheira. Also the encyclopedia says there were some attempts to capture Columbus, which didn't happen. He supposedly sailed around the islands of Santa Maria and São Miguel for five days, waiting for the release of his men.

The island's captain eventually released the rest of Niña's crew admitting he had failed to capture Columbus. The Niña was then able to sail again, where it ran into another storm a few days later. The storm carried it to the mouth of Tagus River in Lisbon, before finally reaching the Spanish soil.

Although it is almost certain Columbus stopped at Santa Maria, there are no reliable reports that he actually disembarked and put his feet there.

Lajes last in energy conservation

With an overall goal of reducing energy use by 27 percent this year, Lajes is only about halfway to its goal—and dead last in the command—with less than three months left.

Lajes energy reduction is only expected to peak at about a 12 percent reduction, according to Master Sgt. Michael Gilbert, installation energy manager—and he added that's not a good thing, especially with the spotlight focused during Energy Conservation Month.

"When you compare our reduction rate to other USAFE bases we come in dead last," Gilbert said.

He said the key reason Lajes places last deals with cooler offices.

Gilbert said past initiatives raised the quality of life by placing air conditioning in our living quarters and most of our workspaces are largely the cause.

Gilbert offered three reasons the federal government is on the quest to cut its energy use:

1. Increase national security by reducing the need for foreign oil
2. Show good stewardship and efficient use of assets paid for by taxpayers' money
3. Reduce the load on the already taxed distribution system on Lajes.

Meanwhile, Gilbert is energizing facility managers and everyone he can reach during the 31-day campaign to make people

aware of energy usage. The federal government is the largest domestic consumer of energy. President Bush has responded by asking all federal facilities to reduce energy consumption by 30 percent by 2010.

Gilbert has also marshaled adults and children alike to help spread the word.

Students at the elementary school created posters to be placed at key points around base to heighten energy conservation awareness.

Further, Gilbert offered the following tips to cut down on the power bill:

- AtHome**
 - Turn off unneeded lights and appliances.
 - Avoid running large appli-

ances between 9 a.m.-3 p.m.

- Set air conditioning to 76-78 degrees in the day and turn it off at night. In the daytime, keep heat in/out by closing blinds and curtains.

- Use fans when possible instead of the air conditioner.

- As it starts to cool off, turn off air conditioners and open windows if the house gets a bit warm

- Check and clean air filters for air conditioners at least once a month (free replacements are available at the base self-help store).

At Work

- Turn computers, copiers and other business equipment to their energy-saving settings, and turn them off at the end of the day and on weekends.

Colonel Fred Hannan, medical group commander, stressed that the medical team was working on options for the future.

He said giving birth in Angra and stork nesting may not be the only options for expectant mothers.

"There are other state-of-the-art facilities we may be able to use," he said. "In the meantime, we're working with Angra to make 'Partnership in Care' - including our staff and practices in our patients' care - a reality."

Sharing one's experiences and making sug-

gestions is a must, Hannan said.

"The OB staff is making an honest, sincere effort to try and learn from those who have experienced it here," he said. "We will try to wrap all this information up for us and all of you to use."

"I'd like to see these ladies informed, and have more options," Callies said.

deployed more than 3,500 miles and set up two forward bases."

Once in place, USAFE's airmen quickly saw action. HH-60 helicopters and personnel deployed from Naval Air Station, Keflavik, Iceland, along with support from the 786th Security Forces Squadron, Sembach Air Base, Germany, provided tactical airlift reinforcing the U.S. Embassy with U.S. European Command's Assessment Team and U.S. Marines who augmented the security forces in country, he said.

"During those initial sorties, our aircrews withstood volleys of AK-47 fire and mortar rounds bursting within a football field's distance of the compound's walls," Steel said. "We also had one of our medical teams live in the embassy. This team's skills were needed, but fortunately not too often."

In addition, USAFE's airfield experts helped re-open the main airport in Liberia and made sure it was safe for U.S. Air Force and other aircraft, he said. Moreover, when a surprising illness afflicted 40 plus Marines, USAFE airmen rapidly provided the medical evacuation and treatment needed for them to be transported to hospitals.

Other Air Force professionals on site included security forces, theater air mobility and rescue forces, communications experts, civil engineers and finance personnel. There were many others who supported the operation from Northern European bases, he added.

"In addition to their role within the Joint Task Force, USAFE's deployed airmen provided a face on our nation's commitment to our partners in this part of the world," Steel said.

By September, military forces from African nations had deployed to Monrovia and a degree of stability returned. As of Oct. 1, the United Nations assumed the lead for peace operations in Liberia.

adjust a risk-laden plan. Remind everyone of their responsibility to make sensible transportation arrangements before they consume alcohol.

Each of us has a responsibility to watch out for each other and our families. If you see someone who has consumed too much alcohol, don't expect the person to use common sense; intervene as needed. Likewise, care for your families by helping them understand the risks and hazards of your location so they can make smart, safe decisions. Your intervention could mean the difference between life and death.

When we return to work, be prepared for the change of sea-

sons. Inspect your facilities and make government and personal vehicles ready for the changing road conditions by checking fluids, tires and wiper blades. Our attitudes also need to change with the seasons. The days are shorter and the weather can deteriorate rapidly. Plan ahead for winter hazards so you are not caught off-guard.

You are all encouraged to get out and enjoy local festivities, but take care of each other and make smart decisions that will return you safely home. We need each of you to meet the mission challenges ahead.


