Program highlights volunteers

Many military, civilian and family members make a difference throughout U.S. Air Forces in Europe and host nation communities daily, and now a new program will unveil their efforts.

Hidden Heroes, an initiative recently introduced by Gen. Robert H. "Doc" Foglesong, USAFE commander, puts the spotlight on volunteers and the difference their efforts make for everyone in the command.

"We call them Hidden Heroes because most of these people don't want any notoriety, they don't do it for any other reason than because it's a good thing to do - helping somebody makes them feel good about themselves," he said. "So we're searching out those people who are doing that and honoring them with this program."

The program is one of 11 combat and special interest initiatives intended to boost volunteer and resource management programs already in place.

Foglesong, a strong advocate for volunteerism, created the Hidden Heroes program to recognize the contribution volunteers make to USAFE communities by bringing these unsung heroes to center stage in public awareness.

"It's one of my favorite programs," Foglesong said. "It's an opportunity to recognize people who organize and contribute to help better the lives, voluntarily, across the spectrum for others."

Price hike for Lajes

After noticing an increase when he purchased gas, Senior Airman Will Gleason, a crew chief in the 729th Air Mobility Squadron, realized gas prices had gone up at the Army and Air Force Exchange Service gas station.

Gleason wasn't the only one that noticed the hike from \$1.55 to \$1.78, that started Oct. 1.

"I noticed the gas prices had gone up, but after living in England



for three years, I knew it was to be expected," said Master Sgt. John Liddell

from the 65th Comptroller Flight.

The increase should only come as a surprise to people who have not been station here for at least a year or in Europe before, said Dave Parker the AAFES retail manager here.

"The way gas prices are established throughout headquarters is

we take the Department of Energy's average for our particular grade of gas for the last two years and then we add in the incremental cost," said Parker.

Parker said incremental costs help pay for things such as labor and operations at the gas station.

"The prices are not set by AAFES," said Parker. "The average price is the same for every base in Europe. The price at each base is different because the incremental cost is different depending on the region."

Although there was a 23-cent increase for gas here, Parker said it is still lower than other AAFES gas station's in Europe.

Patrons in Turkey pay \$2.29 per gallon; in the Netherlands and Germany, the price is \$2.04; and in the United Kingdom, it is \$1.98 per gallon.

"I was surprised when my total was a little higher than it normally is, but compared to the gas in the states, it's about average," said Gleason. "And it's still a lot cheaper than paying nearly four Euros per gallon off base."

AF unveils development plan

WASHINGTON — Air Force leaders are launching a spread-the-word tour in November to explain force development, a new system that transforms how the service will train, educate and assign people to meet mission challenges.

Teams led by major command general officers will visit every base to explain the details of this initiative and to ensure officers understand the concept, policies and procedures.

Although the first phase of implementing force development targets processes affecting members of the officer corps, all elements — enlisted, civilian, Reserve and Air National Guard — will eventually benefit from the force development construct, said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. John P. Jumper.

Current and future phases of this transformation will include adjustments to officer academic and professional military education and professional development processes, enlisted professional development and professional military education programs, management of senior enlisted leaders and development of Air Force civilian employees.

According to the AFSLMO director, Brig.

Gen. Richard S. Hassan, force-development doctrine consists of three levels: tactical, operational and strategic.

At the tactical level, airmen will continue to concentrate on learning primary skills.

At the operational level, airmen begin developing complementary skills and an understanding of the broader Air Force perspective.

At the strategic level, airmen combine skills and experiences to develop a knowledge base that extends beyond the Air Force into Defense Department, interagency and international arenas.

"What force development does is recognize their value, consider their expectations and provide them with the right set of skills to help them be the best they can at what they do," Hassan said. (AFNS)

TSP Open Season starts

AIR FORCE PERSONNEL CENTER — Civilian and military employees can sign up for, or change, their Thrift Savings Plan contribution amounts during the "open season" Oct. 15 - Dec. 31.

"TSP is an easy, long-term retirement savings plan, that everyone should consider," said

Senior Master Sgt. Felipe Ortiz, superintendent of the contact center here. "Current account holders might be interested, too, in transferring money from one fund to another — the TSP folks are set up to handle that.

TSP offers investors the chance for lower taxes each year they contribute while not having to pay taxes on earnings until they reach retirement.

Investment money is deposited directly from each paycheck "so you never have to think about it," said Sergeant Ortiz. "That makes it easy to 'pay yourself first' while only investing what you deem appropriate."

The five TSP funds are: the Government Securities Investment (G) Fund; the Common Stock Index Investment (C) Fund; the Fixed Income Index Investment (F) Fund; the Small Capitalization Stock Index Investment (S) Fund; and the International Stock Index Investment (I) Fund.

Contribution elections/changes made between Oct. 15 and Dec. 13 will take effect Dec.



Lajes launches into charity campaign

With 15 percent of the base populace contacted and more than \$7,700 raised so far, the 2003 Combined Federal Campaign-Overseas continues at Lajes through Dec. 10.

This annual fall fund-raising drive allows nearly 4 million federal employees and service members to contribute to more than 1,500 U. S. national and international nonprofit organizations.

Lajes goals for the 2003 campaign are 100 percent contact and to raise approximately \$80,000 for charity; last year Lajes raised more than \$79,000 during the campaign. U.S. Air Forces in Europe raised more than \$1.9 million.

Lajes CFC project officer Capt. Laurie Kachinski said although this is her first time involved, she knows it is worthy work.

"It's important for people to donate because these charities help so many others," she said.

A unique option afforded personnel stationed overseas is to give back to their base or installation by designating "FSYP", for Family Support and Youth Programs, on their pledge form. By regulation, 100 percent of donations to this program must be returned to the base or installation of origin. Last year USAFE bases received more than \$93,205 in FSYP donations.

In 2002, people donated \$11.2 million to charities through the CFC-Overseas program. Contributions can be made in cash, by check or by payroll deduction.

The campaign was established in 1961 and is the largest workplace-charity campaign in the country. On average, one in four federal employees or their family members will benefit from the CFC charities this year alone, according to officials. Donors may designate which charity or charities receives their money by filling out a pledge card.

SecAF denies resignation

U.S. AIR FORCE ACADEMY, Colo. — The secretary of the Air Force has denied a cadet's request to resign in lieu of court-martial.

Cadet 3rd Class Douglas Meester submitted the request July 8 to Air Force Secretary Dr. James G. Roche, officials said.

Charges were preferred against Meester on May 13, for violations of the Uniformed Code of Military Justice. The charges included rape, forcible sodomy, indecent assault and conduct unbecoming of an officer and gentleman for providing alcohol to minors.

Officials said the case may now proceed to court-martial. A court date has not yet been determined. If convicted, Meester faces a maximum punishment of confinement for life, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and dismissal from the Air Force. (AFPN)

Eagle Flag exercise begins

NAVAL AIR ENGINEERING STATION LAKEHURST, N.J. — More than 150 expeditionary combat-support leaders from around the Air Force arrived here Monday for the inaugural Eagle Flag, the Air Force's newest flag-level

exercise.

The goal of the exercise is to test the ability of the participants to open and establish an air base to an initial operating capability for a forward operation, regardless of mission or aircraft type. The Air Mobility Warfare Center's 421st Training Squadron, located at Fort Dix, N.J., is the lead agency for conducting the exercise.

The participating leaders, who are all in their air and space expeditionary force spin-up window, were called to deploy to Eagle Flag by AEF Center officials at Langley Air Force Base, Va., the same way they would for a real-world deployment.

About 30 participants, designated the key and essential leaders, including the exercise deployment commander, Col. Lisa Firmin, commander of the 27th Mission Support Group at Cannon AFB, N.M., were among the first to arrive. They began initial operation planning.

Firmin's goal for the exercise is simple.

"I hope to validate the concept of Eagle Flag and demonstrate just how valuable and vital expeditionary combat support is to the Air Force mission," she said. "This will be the most realistic training (exercise participants) will receive, apart from an actual deployment." (AFPN)

The Day of the Warrior

■ *Wing preps obstacle course, tests for Warrior Day Nov. 7*

Six mental and physical events will test Lajes airmen during the 65th Air Base Wing's Warrior Day event happening in the Top of the Rock's park Nov. 7.

The event begins at 8 a.m. gathering more than 40 airmen from more than a dozen units across Lajes Field. This is the second Warrior Day for 2003. The wing's first Warrior Day took place April 25 and was won by the 65th Civil Engineering Squadron.

Event organizer Senior Master Sgt. Robin McMullen said all aspects of the competition are coming together to make this day of the warrior an eventful one.

"Our organizers have really done a fine job putting this together," she said. "From team organization to the closing barbecue, we're out to make this Warrior Day memorable."

Each team has four members who will wear the battle-dress uniform pants, a black shirt and combat boots. Some squadrons have created

internal competitions to choose their four team members, McMullen said.

McMullen said earning a Warrior Day medal wouldn't be easy. The six events, she said, are designed to call on every aspect of an airman's skills.

They include:

— A physical fitness challenge. The event is shaped much like the Air Force fitness challenge. Competitors will do push ups and sit ups, however, they'll run two miles instead of one and a half.

— Gas mask drill. Competitors will be given 15 seconds to don a gas mask. Evaluators will then inspect the mask's fit and give a score based on seven areas.

— "Knowledge Bowl." All questions for the "Jeopardy"-like event will be taken from the

Airman's manual. Each competitor will be given 10 questions and can carry a copy of the manual.

— Obstacle course. While the course is still being designed, it will present six tests: a log walk, eight-tire weave, double-wall climb, buddy drag, fire extinguisher use, and low crawl. When finished, the course traveler goes back through the first four obstacles in reverse order.

— Self-aid and buddy care evaluation. The event is designed to test each competitor's ability to treat injuries.

— Weapons assembly. Competitors will need to assemble the M-9 and M-16 in two minutes.

The day wraps up with a barbecue and awards ceremony.

Training keeps the force moving ahead

Senior NCOs are often asked what made them stay in the Air Force so long. The answers I hear usually fall into two categories: love of country and contribution to the mission.

However, many first-term airmen don't recognize their contributions as vital ones. Further, on many occasions, supervisors may fail to make their jobs exciting and challenging, and our newest recruits lose interest. This can deteriorate morale and leave our forces in a training drought.

As we have surged to meet the unpredictable threat, post 9-11 training has slipped. The expertise needed to carry out the defense of our nation has drawn down. However, as we reconstitute and focus on the growth of our team, now is the time to focus on training.

Key to keeping our airman's interest is commitment. We have to be committed to seeing first termers through their career development course studies while following the Career Field Education Training Plan. Combining the two creates a recipe for success: a thorough understanding of the job while gaining the fulfillment needed to be successful in every technical endeavor.



First, the importance of CDCs. Getting involved with the CDC process, ensuring the training and task accomplishment you need relates to those study manuals cannot be overstated. As such, spend time with airmen to help them understand and fulfill the requirements of those study manuals. Provide feedback; make the process interactive with take-home tests, verbal quizzes and researching areas of concern? In other words, get involved.

Next, show your troops how the CFETP brings it all together. The plan provides the timeline for individual success in a career of an Airman. Get your troops invested in their on-the-job training. Explaining each task to the airman and not just "signing off" tasks will make a huge impact on the ability of

wings to carry out their missions.

We can make the difference by doing all of these things. In return, we'll reap huge rewards. The troop gets the personal gratification of learning a new trade and the Air Force gets a certified warfighter.

There is no deeper satisfaction than seeing a newly trained airman doing a job. Just recently, I saw it here. The power went out at the security forces building and we had to call the civil engineer team power shop to fix it. Their team of folks came in, changed out a transformer, strung the power lines, and had power back on line within two hours.

These well-trained troops didn't need checklists or didn't fumble around. Supervisors had trained and certified these folks to turn the power back on — and they did so with professionalism, savvy and an acumen that reflected their training.

You don't think it makes a difference? Who do you think turned the power back on in Baghdad?

Ultimately, we want our troops to feel the same love of country and draw the same satisfaction of contribution we senior NCOs feel. And with a few simple steps as a part of the training process, we can do it.

Make a commitment to CDCs and CFETP and then see how the mission is more effectively orchestrated.

phasis on volunteer programs already in existence and to make plans to explore new ways of meeting the goals of the program, said Janie Illing, USAFE Family Matters Hidden Heroes action officer.

"In addition to recognizing those who willingly give their time and talents to base organizations, Hidden Heroes seeks to

increase the number of volunteer opportunities available and recruit more volunteers to fill those new positions," she said.

Illing said the program will bring comprehensiveness and standardization to the current management of volunteer programs.

"The success of the Hidden Heroes program at each base will be measured by capturing data on three metrics: an in-

creased number of volunteer opportunities available, an increased number of volunteers on base and an increased number of volunteer hours worked," she said.

A designated representative will implement the program at each unit and report data to the base point of contact.

Previously, volunteers were recognized in a variety of ways depending on the base. In the

new program, volunteers will be recognized in special recognition ceremonies, with distinctive coins and certificates in a more timely manner, she said.

"There are hidden heroes in our midst. All we have to do is look around and take the time to notice the quiet contributions volunteers make each day," Illing said. "If everyone engages with the spirit of this new initiative, all of our bases will be on their way to success."



Bowling center benefits base

(Editor's Note: this is part one in a four part series about the history of bowling on Lajes and the upcoming changes for the Lajes Bowling Center.)

The U.S. military has recognized the benefits of having bowling centers at military bases throughout the world. At present, the largest military bowling facility has 48 lanes and the smallest is located in Cutler, Maine with 2 lanes! Ten-pin bowling has been the number one favorite recreational activity at military bases worldwide. Here at Lajes field, our winter "famous" wind-driven rains results in Hillside lanes being the favorite "hangout" by all.

It is that time of year when bowlers worldwide organize into leagues and start the traditional annual winter bowling season.

With the major renovation of Hillside Lanes not scheduled for completion until this December it is anticipated that associations and leagues will not form until sometime just prior to the opening of the



lanes with actual bowling to start shortly after the center reopens again.

Bowlers across the globe do not stand alone. The American Bowling Congress is the worlds largest amateur sports organization with its early beginning dating back to the turn of the 20th Century. Other significant bowling organizations include Women's International Bowling Congress and Youth Bowling Associations. All three provide a host of services and programs that help to promote the sport of ten-pin bowling worldwide.

The first bowling association formed at Lajes Sept. 19, 1960 with 40 people. From this beginning, Lajes formed nine different ABC/WIBC sanction leagues.

The original Lajes bowling center was located in building T-167. It had 10 ABC-certified wood surface

lanes and a "state-of-the-art overhead telescoring system." It was a "split house" with six lanes on one end and four on the other.

Workers completed construction of the current Hillside Lanes located in building T-169 in 1988. It sported 16 adjacent synthetic lanes, an automatic scoring system as well as 10 renovated and six new pinsetter machines.

Bowling went strong in this facility until October 2002, when renovations began. High-pressure laminate synthetic overlays to all bowling lane surfaces, newly rebuilt electronic pinsetters and scoring system are part of the renovation. In addition to facelift, patrons will be able to "have it their way" with a much anticipated and welcome new Burger King concession.

The bowling center disbanded previous men's and women's bowling associations with this current renovation. New sanctioned leagues can start official league bowling new associations will be chartered and leagues formed.
