Stars & Stripes, the Department of Defense's publication for the American military, has established a direct line to Santa Claus for children of all ages.



Service to improve with new 'college'

Lajes customers should soon notice improvements in customer service at base facilities, thanks to a new program aimed at improving the quality of service at the source.

Customer College is a new 40-hour course targeted at front line customer service providers and their supervisors.

"The intention is to foster an atmosphere of dedication to helping others and reinforce a culture of excellent service, personal and organizational pride," said Maj. Steve Rickert, Customer College project officer.

Lajes' Customer College teaches service providers ways to become exceptional at providing customer service, said Rickert.

The training includes techniques for creating and maintaining a positive attitude and improving communications with customers, ways to successfully handle difficult customers, the importance of having a "Plan B" for service delivery, and effective ways to solve the customer's problem when things go wrong.

Rickert said each day's training includes a video that reinforces a major point such as how to handle the difficult customer or how to deal successfully with change.

"The videos are a real hit with the students," said Customer College instructor Larry Scoggins. "They are entertaining, humorous and very effective in making the point."

The students agreed the course had many benefits.

"The first day was enough to dispel any

VA launches 'Kids Page' web site

WASHINGTON — Department of Veterans Affairs officials announced the launch of "VA Kids" on Nov. 5.

The new Web page is designed to help young people understand what it means to be a veteran.

"The ideals of military service and patriotism can be unfamiliar to some children and young adults," said Anthony Principi, VA secretary. "The VA Kids Web page supports President (George W.) Bush's initiatives on

education and volunteerism by providing an entertaining and informative way for young people to learn why veterans are special."

One section of the site targets students in kindergarten through fifth grade, another for students in sixth through 12th grades, and a third for teachers.

The site also has information about VA, Veterans Day, scholarships, student volunteer opportunities, events for disabled veterans and links to veteran-related sites.

New form key to officer careers

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — Force development becomes more tangible for all officers, lieutenant colonel and below, who face assignments next year as they must complete an online Officer Development Plan, which is replacing the old preference worksheet.

A "transitional" version of the form will be available on the Air Force Personnel Center Web site this week, officials said.

Under the plan, those up for permanent changes of station in

calendar 2004 will have to fill out the form by logging on to the personnel center's assignment management system.

It marks the launch of the revamped online assignment preference portion of the new force development concept.

Filling out the form is similar to accomplishing the old 'preference worksheet,' officials said.

But there are different blanks to fill in and some new questions to answer that will give career field leaders more of the information they need to put the right person in the right job at the right time.



GETTING SCHOOLED

USAFE goes the distance for leadership students learning skills

Staff Sgt. Jeff Garcia looks more like he's leading an auction rather than teaching a class. His hands are swirling, his eyebrows arch and rules the room as he makes points about some of the hot spots of the world.

Between punctuations, pauses and laughs, Garcia's emphatic, positive style masks unfamiliarity with his surroundings. In a room the size of J-Lo's shoe closet in a building as old as his father, the professional military education instructor teaches 16 airmen he's never met on an island he's never visited.

How deep seeded was Garcia's fear of this new place?

"I looked out the classroom window and saw water. And it was a lot," he said, eyes wide.

Fear aside, Garcia is conducting something of an auction with students bidding on their future as Air Force NCOs. He and Master Sgt. Kaleth Wright just finished teaching the five-week long Airman Leadership School course.

What's unusual about that? Lajes along with Keflavik Naval Air Station, Iceland are the only two places in the Air Force where

the two instructors, the prerequisite instructor briefings and more than 16,000 documents needed to teach ALS are brought here — the only such practice in the Air Force.

As Class 04-1 graduates today, it becomes the last of three courses taught here this year. Admittedly, the courses come to Lajes, "whenever there is a need," according to Master Sgt. Rich Williamson, the wing's chief of professional development.

"The hardest part is getting instructors in," Williamson added. "At the same time Keflavik is trying to get teachers, the school houses in USAFE are trying to stay fully manned. So, we pick a few dates and try and get those approved. It can be a balancing act."

Indeed. Most bases teach as many as seven ALS courses per year. NCO Academies are filled between nine and 12

times per year. Pulling instructors from there to come here some 3,000 miles from home can be daunting. Explaining the need, he said, even more so.

Williamson, an 18-year veteran, said the driving force for when he selects class dates are promotions to staff sergeant. He also makes a flexible forecast at the start of each fiscal year wedging the classes between four first-term airmen center sessions and three NCO professional development classes.

"Based on the amount of people selected for promotion, that's when we start flagging dates," he said.

Williamson's USAFE counterpart is Master Sgt. Cynthia Wyatt, who runs professional military education for the command. She said bringing the instructors to the island makes more sense than having a school to manage.

"When it's time to go do the class, we always have instructors who are willing and ready to go," she said. "It's a great opportunity for them."

Wright, a dual-certified ALS and NCO Academy instructor also based in Germany said he was ready but tentative about the Lajes trip.

"There's a comfort zone," he said. "In Germany, I know where everything is. There are rules established and those rules are relative to your community."

However, coming to Lajes, the rules are different. For instance, ALS curriculum asks students to perform reveille and retreat as well as do drill and ceremonies. That can't be done at Lajes based on agreements Americans have with their Portuguese hosts.

As such, Garcia and Wright changed the game plan. Williamson teamed up to help. The trio incorporated more classroom time. Williamson helped by upgraded digital projectors, personal computers, and making other upgrades.

Meanwhile, there have been changes to the class in recent years. ALS is broken into three blocks: the profession at arms, leadership and communications. The course, developed by USAFE Command Chief Master Sgt. Gary Coleman in 1990, saw its most recent revisions in October.

Those revisions dealt with communications and how newly promoted staff sergeants use interpersonal skills in leadership.

Wright said the emphasis goes to leadership and supervision.

"I want the students to leave with an understanding of how to take care of their troops," he said. "It's a balanced combination of classroom instruction augmented with the

instructors' personal experiences. It all meshes very well."

Col. Kurt Klingenger, 65th Air Base Wing vice commander, agreed.

"The rewards don't come the day you get done with class," he said to the class during a recent mixer. "They may not even come two or three years after that. But you will reap the rewards of this class."

Getting schooled like this is just fine with Staff Sgt.

Lawrance Lasker, the class leader. In the service for better than five years, Lasker said it was strange "having the school come to me," but is getting plenty from the visit.

"I want to be a better supervisor. Once I graduate, I'll have a new troop under my belt. This class is important because it will help me shape a new airman's mind," he said.

Meanwhile, unlike Lasker, some students dreaded the idea of attending the course. Staff Sgt. Tabitha Bennett's experience is not unlike others going to their first day of ALS. With a 2-year-old child and a

husband who does shift work, Bennett's anxiety leapt off the scale the night before class — and she forgot to set her alarm.

"When I called in late to the instructor, I was in tears," she told the current group of students recently. "I told him I'd be there in 10 minutes as soon as I could get a uniform on. He said, 'Ma'am, you will not come to class like that. Take a shower first.' He ended up putting me at ease and the rest of the journey was great."

Alongside, the instructors make journeys of their own here. Garcia and Wright played on the school's intramural flag football team and participated in wing events like mock quarterly boards and more.

As the students received their diplomas, Wright summed up their efforts, ending the educational auction that started 35 days ago knowing what's been learned here will carry on.

"The students learned the next level of leadership, they had a good time and they made the most of it," he concluded. "That's what matters."



Escaping to Peace

Chaplain evades communism to fulfill life quest

Father Stan never considered American citizenship when he bolted Soviet oppression in 1983. His eyes were fixed on Canada, Australia and, his first destination, England. He served the church in Great Britain for nearly four years.

However, his order asked him to move to Indiana in 1987. Father Stan said he fought going but eventually conceded to the idea.

After clearing up some passport problems – caused mostly by the Polish justice department – Father Stan found himself in Maryville, Ind.

But not for long. After a year, Father Stan celebrated Mass in East Chicago and eventually made his way to Phoenix, Ariz., offering services for that community's more than 72,000 Polish-American citizens.

Meanwhile, fulfillment of another goal in his life was taking shape to become a chaplain.

"I always wanted to be a military chaplain – even in Poland," he said. "I gave up that idea because I dreaded the thought that the communists would pay me. My father instilled in me a great animosity against the communists. We were occupied by the Soviets – and I did not want to serve the Soviets."

Conversely, the thought of serving the American military suited him just fine. However, when the goal reignited its flame in 1992, Father Stan was not an American citizen. He asked the recruiting official at Bolling AFB, D.C., if he could become a chaplain without the citizenship and was told, "no."

So, he called a few friends – like

Arizona senator John McCain – to pull a few strings. Still the answer came back the same – no citizenship, no chaplain job.

On July 17, 1992, Father Stan fixed that and earned his U.S. citizenship. Within a month, he was able to join the Air Force chaplain corps.

Life as a chaplain

With 11 years of service now, Father Stan's deployed five times to places like Saudi Arabia, Cuba and Bosnia. According to the Air Force Personnel Center, he is one of 104 priests serving better than 68,400 Catholics wearing blue.

Adjustment to the military life took time. When he entered the service, he had nothing. Literally. The Salvatorians provided almost everything he needed – a place to sleep at the rectory, clothes, transportation and more.

"I had to buy everything from a needle to a car," he said. "I depended so much on the order. I learned to live and appreciate how other people live."

Since then, Father Stan said he's learned about diversity and working with other denominations to bring comfort to troops across the spectrum.

He admitted his work was not done. He still feels the frustrations any lay leader might. There are "difficult moments" that make him question his role in the chaplain corps, he said, but they are not nearly as difficult as arrest and interrogation. For that, he is thankful.

"There are moments – things that happen – that make me convinced that I should stay," he concluded. "When I see those moments, I see the reason why I am here. That makes it very worthwhile."
