Show host brings AF background

The emcee for a whirlwind musical and comedy show making six stops in Europe carries with her three decades of Air Force family life and the want to give back to her country.

Mary Therese Tebbe serves as hostess for the Air Force Reserve's Operation Seasons Greetings program. It includes combined bands from the Air Force Reserve Center and USAFE, New England Patriot Cheerleaders, Comedian Andy Andrews, Restless Heart and Tebbe.

Operations Seasons Greetings kicked off at Lajes Nov. 18. More than 300 people attended the show.

Tebbe, a news anchorperson for a television station in Macon,

Ga. said she feels as though she's playing "Bob Hope in a dress" and it's a great way to give back something to the troops.

"I grew up watching Bob Hope USO specials on television. I never missed them. So, although I can't wear the uniform to give back, I always thought it was so awesome to be able to spread a little cheer to people who were far away from home," she said.

Tebbe said she also understands Air Force life. Her father was a recruiter in the Air Force Reserve for 32 years. She spent time at Scott AFB, Ill. before her family eventually settled at Warner Robins AFB, Ga.

Tebbe said she's been in nine countries in three years. She traveled with the USO tour in

2000, 2001 and 2002, performing in Japan, Korea, Germany, Italy, Spain, England, and Turkey. This was her first visit to the Azores. Her 2002 visit got canceled when high winds forced the show's C-141 Starlifters to fly elsewhere three separate times.

Tebbe said her involvement with Operations Seasons Greetings also had meaning for her father, who died two years ago.

"He was so proud of me being involved in this," she said. "It means a lot to me knowing he's smiling down from heaven and knowing that I am doing these missions."

Meanwhile, Tebbe's work wasn't confined to the stage. She visited with more than 30 students from Lajes' elementary and high schools Nov. 18. She talked

about her career in journalism and handed out footballs, hats and candy on behalf of Warner Robins High School.

"I thoroughly enjoy coming and talking to the kids because I am a military brat," she said. "Although I didn't go overseas, I understood what it meant to pack up and leave your friends behind."

The tour continues Saturday at Incirlik Air Base, Turkey and then moves onto Spangdahlem and Ramstein Air Base, Germany; and wraps up at Royal Air Force Lakenheath, England. Tebbe said it's the chance of a lifetime.

"This is my one opportunity that I'm seizing and going with," she said. "It's that important to me."

'One click, one call'

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — A one-stop customer service phone number and Web page are up and running, linking several call centers and online resources Air Force people use when managing personnel and pay information.

A single phone number and a companion Web site now make it easier for Air Force active-duty and reserve component military, as well as U.S. appropriated fund civilian employees to find what they need quickly, Air Force Personnel Center officials said.

Customers can find answers to questions by calling toll free (800) 616-3775 or visiting www.afpc.randolph.af.mil/cst. Until now the burden has been on Air Force people to determine which agency handles a particular issue before contacting customer service by phone or on the Web. Customers will be able to access any of the following support services by using the new number and Web site:

- Air Force Contact Center for general military personnel inquiries, including discrimination and sexual harassment concerns and assistance in navigating the virtual military personnel flight application.

- Air Reserve Personnel Center in Denver for Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard personnel inquiries.

- Defense Finance and Accounting Service's Cleveland Contact Center for Air Force military pay inquiries and assistance with the myPay application.

- AFPC Technical Assistance Center for technical support for applications such as vMPF, assignment management system, AFPC Secure and PC-III.

- AFPC Recruiting Service Center for civilian appropriated fund job opportunities.

- AFPC Benefits and Entitlements Service Team for civilian appropriated-fund benefits and entitlements.

Bad checks earns confinement

Writing bad checks earned an airman basic 21 days of confinement and a reduction in grade to airman basic in a summary court martial Nov. 7.

Steven G. Barron, 729th Air Mobility Squadron, pled guilty to one charge of Article 123a. Article 123a is making, drawing and uttering check, draft or order without sufficient funds. Barron bounced three checks totaling \$750 at the Top of the Rock Club.

Barron admitted knowing that his checking account was closed when he wrote the bad checks. The Pentagon Federal Credit Union closed his account months prior because of other bad checks Barron had written.

Lt. Col. Steve Sorensen, 729th Air Mobility Squadron commander, said writing a bad check is a crime no matter how it's viewed.

"A misperception in some people's minds is that writing bad checks to a financial institution is a victimless crime. The reality is

that such an offense is no different than stealing money or property from another person," he said. "The recent court-martial conviction for 'writing bad checks with intent to defraud' validates the seriousness of such a crime."

A summary court-martial may be used to handle offenses that are too severe for an Article 15. Only enlisted members can be tried by summary court martial. One officer acts as judge and jury. Barron could have been reduced to the lowest enlisted grade, forfeited of two-thirds pay for one month and been confined for 30 days as a maximum punishment.

If the charge against Barron had been referred to a special court-martial, the maximum sentence would have been a bad-conduct discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances and confinement for 1 year, according to the Manual of Courts Martial.

If referred to a general court martial, the maximum sentence would have been a dishonorable discharge, forfeiture of all pay and allowances and confinement for 5 years.



world-class people is not only being met but is continually being expounded upon, said Gen. Robert H. "Doc" Foglesong, USAFE commander, and Chief Master Sgt. Gary G. Coleman, USAFE command chief master sergeant.

"In our base visits since taking command, one common thread is apparent; our airmen and civilian workforce - both at home base and deployed - are busy doing incredible work in support of the Global War on Terrorism and fulfilling America's national security objectives," Foglesong said.

"Our military operations increasingly cross multiple theaters and unified commands," the general continued. "With more than 1,500 USAFE members deployed to expeditionary bases across the globe, and approximately 2,700 more Air Force professionals deployed to our European theater to support our home bases, it's apparent that we're a very busy, forward leaning and engaged command. Chief Coleman and I couldn't be more proud of the

great work we've seen."

And this great work can not only be found in home base and contingency operations, but also in the increased services provided through the command's 12 newly rolled out combat and special interest programs, said Coleman. Engineer perfect

CES hammers 2nd straight football title

Capping a second consecutive undefeated season that included 34 wins and 11 shutouts, the 65th Civil Engineer Squadron defeated the joint forces, air base wing, mission support and services team 19-0 Nov. 15 at the Security Forces soccer field.

The engineers led all the way taking advantage of a sputtering JAMS offense. Using short passes and a bevy of run plays, CES and quarterback Adam Miller moved the ball up field, finding the JAMS defensive soft spots.

Miller, however, gave credit to the CES defense.

"They went back to the base coverage we played all year, played their zones, and contained the run by staying home and watching the quarterback," Miller said. "Nothing takes a team out of its

game like good defense. And we had that going for us all season long."

Miller also said defensive pressure created offense. "That opens up the offense and, although it wasn't a high scoring game, the offense doesn't have the pressure of 'we need to score.'"

JAMS had its opportunities in the second half. With CES leading 12-0, JAMS started to move the ball well. However, an errant pass by JAMS quarterback Josh Clark got picked off killing the first drive. A second drive proved fruitless, stalling at CES' one-foot line.

In one of the game's more controversial moments with CES backed up to its own goal line, JAMS defensive lineman Zack Martin grabbed Miller's flag in the end zone for what appeared to be a safety. Officials, however, ruled that Miller had kept the ball over the goal line.

JAMS coach Ernie Bailey said he was

proud of how his team was able to play with CES.

"We played tough. We were the only team to play them competitively this year — and we're proud of that," Bailey said. "Our guys did great and left it all out on the field."

CES defeated JAMS 25-21 Nov. 13 with nine seconds remaining in a battle to see who would advance in the winner's bracket. JAMS then beat the 65th Logistics Readiness Squadron to advance to the championship game.

JAMS was the only team to have CES down in score all season. JAMS led CES 21-18 going into the second-half of the Nov. 13 tussle before CES came back and won it on a 4th down play five yards from the end zone.

The championship caps CES' 34th straight win, dating back to 2002. The team scored more than 600 points on offense while allowing 248.

Lobos take bite out of Falcons bowl chances

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AFP) — The University of New Mexico Lobos took a 24-12 bite out of the U.S. Air Force Academy's bowl aspirations with a dominating win at Lobo Stadium on Nov. 15.

"They certainly made the plays, their team deserved to win, and they were the better football team today," said Fisher DeBerry, Falcons head coach. "We did not make enough plays in the game and only had the one turnover."


Lobos running back DonTrell Moore scored twice on 1-yard runs to put the Lobos up by 14, before the Falcons got within scoring range. But the Lobos defense was tight on the perimeter against the run, which halved the Falcon's usually dominant rushing production and left the offense to again settle for Joey Ashcroft's field goals when touchdowns were needed.

"It was simply a matter of them being able to make plays," DeBerry said.

"I'm not disappointed with the way our guys fought today. They played hard, but we didn't just didn't make enough plays to be a good football team," DeBerry said.

The Lobos extended their lead to 18 with a Wes Zunker field goal and a 10-yard touchdown catch by Adrian Boyd.

New Mexico kept its end zone Falcon-free until halfback Darnell Stephens crossed the goal line on a 1-yard run to bring the Falcons within 12, with 1:57 left in the game. The Falcons failed to convert the 2-point attempt

or come up with the on-side kick, and the Lobos were able to run the clock out for a 24-12 victory.

The Falcons dropped to 7-4 with the loss, while the Lobos improved their record to 7-4.

The loss also deals a virtual deathblow to the Falcons' outside chances of winning the Mountain West Conference title, and muddles the postseason bowl picture even further. Air Force now ranks third out of the four bowl-eligible teams in the conference who are all aiming for the three bowl games

for the conference. Three other conference teams can become bowl-eligible by winning each of their remaining games, which makes Air Force's game on Nov. 22 against San Diego State University all the more important, De Berry said.

"If ... we could figure out a way to win another game, that would give us eight wins, and somebody would have to hopefully take a look at us," DeBerry said, who has led the Falcons to 18 winning seasons and 12 bowl games in his 20 years as Air Force's head football coach.

"But there are no guarantees. There are no assurances," he said.

"I think we're an attractive team for any bowl because of the way our people travel and the things we can bring to a bowl," DeBerry said. "But hey, we're not thinking about that. All we got to figure out now is how we can regroup, come back and be a better football team next week."

For the players, the pain of the loss and giving up 188 yards to Moore will linger until they hit the field for practice Nov. 17, and for some, until the first snap of the final regular-season game Nov. 22.

"I'm just hurting inside, knowing that we could've played a lot better," said Trevor Hightower, Falcons senior linebacker. "It's going to hurt me until we play San Diego. But I really just can't wait to get to practice because we're going to need to play our best game against them."

"I just know that ... this next week's game is going to have a lot to do with how we're remembered as a team," he said.
