

## Stolen VA records: Airmen urged to be vigilant

**WASHINGTON (AFPN)** — Air Force officials are asking Airmen to stay extra vigilant in protecting their credit and themselves from identity theft in light of the recent theft of 26.5 million veteran's records from the home of a Department of Veterans Affairs employee in May.

The VA announced over the weekend that the stolen records might include personal information of people currently in the military, according to a VA news release. Initial findings from the VA indicated the personal information on about 50,000 active duty, National Guard and Reserve Airmen may have been involved.

As the two agencies compared electronic files, VA and the Department of Defense learned that personal information on as many as 1.1 million active-duty servicemembers, 430,000 National Guardsmen, and 645,000 members of the Reserve may have been included in the data theft, according to the VA release June 7.

The VA has received no reports that the stolen data has been used for fraudulent purposes. However, the VA is asking all veterans to carefully monitor bank statements, credit card statements and any statements relating to recent financial transactions.

Several resources are available for people to go to for more information. The VA has set up a special Web site at [www.firstgov.gov/veterans](http://www.firstgov.gov/veterans) info and a

toll-free telephone number, 800-FED-INFO or 800-333-4636, that feature up-to-date news and information on the data compromise.

The site offers tips on how to check credit reports, how to guard against identity theft and whom to call if an individual believes any fraudulent activity is occurring using his or her personal information.

The Air Force and Department of Defense are working closely with the VA to determine how many Airmen and other service members may be affected by the compromise of records. Airmen whose information has been compromised will be notified by the VA so they can take the appropriate steps.

Tips on how to watch for suspicious activity include the following:

— Closely monitor your bank and credit card statements for fraudulent transactions. Monitoring accounts online is the best way to detect fraud early.

— Place a 90-day fraud alert on your credit report, which tells creditors to contact you before opening any new accounts or making any changes to your existing accounts. This action may cause some delays if you are trying to obtain new credit.

— It is only necessary to contact one of three companies to place an alert. That company is then required to contact the other two. The three companies are Equifax (800-525-6285,

[www.equifax.com](http://www.equifax.com)); Experian (888-397-3742, [www.experian.com](http://www.experian.com)); and TransUnion (800-680-7289, [www.transunion.com](http://www.transunion.com)).

Once the fraud alert has been posted, you are entitled to free copies of your credit reports. Review these reports for inquiries from companies you haven't contacted or accounts you didn't open. The alert can be renewed after 90 days.

Airmen are advised to take the following steps if they discover fraudulent accounts or transactions:

— Contact the financial institution to close the fraudulent account(s) that have been tampered with.

— File a report with the local police department.

— File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission by phone at 877-438-4338, online at [www.consumer.gov/idtheft](http://www.consumer.gov/idtheft), or by mail to Identity Theft Clearinghouse, Federal Trade Commission, 600 Pennsylvania Avenue NW, Washington, DC 20580.

Additionally, Family Support Centers across the Air Force are prepared to assist anyone with questions regarding identity theft or similar financial concerns, Air Force officials said.

## Air Force selects 57 Lajes members for Tech., Master

**RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas** - Fifty-seven staff sergeants and technical sergeants from Lajes were selected for promotion.

The Air Force has selected 4,613 of 23,230 eligible technical sergeants for promotion to master sergeant, a 19.85 percent selection rate; and 6,904 of 41,186 eligible staff sergeants for promotion to technical sergeant, a 16.76 percent selection rate.

The master sergeant selection rate dropped 6.19 percent from last year, while this year's technical sergeant rate dropped 4.25 percent from last year.

The Air Force programs the top five enlisted grades to 56 percent of enlisted end strength. The programmed FY07 reduction in total enlisted end strength from 282,822 to 264,424 resulted in lower enlisted promotion quotas.

## Thumb drive security a must on government computers

An Airman recently purchased a two-gigabyte thumb drive from the BX. The Airman uses the drive primarily for personal use but periodically uses it to transfer files between work and home. The drive is full of mp3's downloaded from the Internet, work-related documents and a new video game.

The above scenario occurs more often these days with the availability of large amounts of storage space at a fairly inexpensive price, in a convenient, small package.

You are probably now asking yourself, "What's the big deal? It's mine and I can do with it as I please."

You are correct that it is yours and for the most part you can do with it as you please. However, once the drive is connected to the Lajes Field network it poses a risk to the net-

work and the "I can do with it as I please" statement is invalid.

This scenario poses several risks which people may not be aware of. Below are some tips to mitigate the risks.

The first risk is it can easily introduce a virus to the network. AFI 33-202 Vol 1 (*Network and Computer Security*) requires all removable media to be virus scanned as soon as it is connected to the network. How many people are taking the time to properly scan the device before transferring files? All it takes is one user to jeopardize the operation of the network by introducing a virus they contracted on their home computer.

Let's assume someone does the virus scan on their thumb drive as required, they don't have anything to worry about, do they? What about the mp3's and the game they have loaded? Once they connect the thumb drive to a government PC it becomes part of the Lajes Field Network. The network

is constantly scanned for illegal software and unauthorized activity.

Games are not authorized on the network and hopefully any downloaded music on the drive is not breaking any copyright laws.

Once a computer with illegal software is identified, unit client support administrator's are contacted to remove it. This causes a lot of extra work for CSAs and if a pattern of abuse is identified it could result in disciplinary action from the chain of command.

Remember all of the work-related documents stored on the drive? What if you lose the drive? Whoever becomes the future owner of this drive now has access to all the files on the drive. How much privacy act information is on the drive? How much sensitive, but unclassified, information is on the drive? How could the information contained on the drive be used by the "bad" guys? According to Tech. Sgt. Horton, 65th Communica-

tions Squadron, "In order for our Air Force team to continue to have the technological 'upper hand' in the future, we have got to, as individuals, treat our network as the weapon system it is, and protect it as such today."

Please keep this in mind and safeguard the device as needed.

"We know the use of thumb drives is fast and efficient, but we need to be careful," said Senior Airman Paul Ward, 65th CS.

Use caution and apply appropriate safeguards to keep the network secure. Make sure to virus scan the media as soon as it is connected to a government PC. Do not introduce illegal or unauthorized software to the network. And make sure to secure the thumb drive properly if it contains any official files.

### World Cup won't be aired on AFN

Despite the American Forces Network Broadcast Center's best and most exhaustive effort, the underlying international broadcast rights holder of *FIFA World Cup 2006 Germany™* has declined AFN-BC's request to distribute a limited amount of matches via closed circuit means only. Therefore, AFN viewers and listeners will have to rely on host-country media for coverage.

"We (AFN-BC) did everything humanly possible to effect a favorable outcome to this clearance quest, enlisting the direct intervention of Major League Soccer/Soccer United Marketing, the U.S. domestic broadcast rights holder of the Cup, along with executives of the International Federation of Football Associations," stated Tom Weber, Director of Industry Liaison for AFN-BC.

Weber added, "Because commercial broadcast licenses were sold around the world on an exclusive basis, the underlying international rights holder was legally bound and, therefore, unable to grant AFN permission to distribute selected events, to include all Team USA matches, from this year's Cup."

### 7-digit dialing change

The base converted from 5-digit to 7-digit dialing. Instead of dialing 2-XXXX, people now have to have to dial 535-XXXX for all on-base calls.

Those who have speed-dial buttons programmed on their phone or have their phone Call Forwarded will have to reenter the numbers with 535-XXXX.

This change is directed by the Defense Information Systems Agency. All Air Force bases are changing to 7-digit dialing.

# Lead level concern at base school

Two sources of water at the Department of Defense Dependent Schools here were reported higher than normal after recent tests.

In a sampling study, the Bioenvironmental Engineer Flight discovered trace amounts of lead in a sink used for food preparation at the school and another small classroom sink.

Plumbing corrosion in pipes and faucets is the cause of lead in water.

Only two of the 38 sinks tested were at levels of concern, although the one for food preparation tested within regulation level.

The results of the lead levels from the sink used for food preparation tested at a maximum contaminant level of .019. According to AFI 48-144, Drinking Water Surveillance, the compliance limit is .020 milligrams per liter. Although the sink is in compliance, in an effort to be proactive, a new faucet has been ordered.

Replacing the faucet is the first step, according to Capt. Leilani Bush, Bioenvironmental Engineer Flight chief. Based on the results of surrounding sinks, it may just be the fixture, she said. After installing new fixtures another test is conducted to determine the lead levels.

"If we're still getting high levels, the next step is to replace the older pipes," she said.

The second, an adult sink in one of the classrooms exceeded the compliance limit with an MCL of .022. This sink is scheduled to be replaced.

The Environmental Protection Agency began testing lead in 1974 as part of the Safe Drinking Water Act. They've established an action limit of .015 MCL to control the level of lead individuals are exposed to.

"All numbers are conservative for drinking water," explained Captain Bush.

Limited use of sinks can cause an increased level of lead because the water sits, according to the captain.

"We always recommend in the morning before getting water to let it run for a moment or two, she said.

The testing conducted by the Bioenvironmental Engineer Flight helps ensure sinks are in compliance whether they are used daily as a source of drinking water or

are never used at all.

Two sinks with faucets that were close to, but below, the action limit were also replaced.

"We're doing the right thing," Captain Bush said. "We've tested the water, identified two fixtures and are being proactive to ensure kid's safety."

The amount of lead found at the school doesn't pose a health risk for students here, but parents may call the clinic to schedule an appointment for blood lead levels screening by calling the appointment line at 535-3261.

"Drinking water is the least way for lead to enter your body," said Staff Sgt. Clay Thompson, Community Health NCOIC. "Lead levels in water are not severe unless there is long-term exposure."

Children are the most at risk for lead poisoning.

"Children absorb lead more easily than adults," Sergeant Thompson said. "Children are more likely to put objects with lead in their mouth."

Children starting at 12-15 months of age should be screened, with follow-ups as recommended by your physician, explained the sergeant.

Older children may be tested when there are unexplained signs or symptoms, or in the event a study reveals lead levels that may pose a risk to them.

"Parents can request a blood lead level test for their child at any time," said Sergeant Thompson. Test results take two to three weeks to come back.

Short-term health effects or exposure to lead include developmental delays and deficits in attention span, hearing and learning abilities. Long-term exposure can lead to stroke and kidney disease as well as cancer.

Signs and symptoms of lead poisoning include stomachache and cramps, irritability, frequent vomiting, constipation, headache, sleep disorders and poor appetite.

Good nutrition can reduce the absorption and effects of lead. Children whose diets include calcium and iron absorb less lead.

Lead levels are tested in base housing annually, Captain Bush said.

In child development and youth centers, testing is done every three years.

There were no reports of lead in the child development center or the youth center.

## Security Forces Blotter

June 10

LOCATION: T-1010/Cinco Picos Compound

Complainant notified SFS to report the fence adjacent to T-1010 had a three sided rectangular cut, approximately 3 foot by 1.5 foot. The complainant further stated he never noticed the hole was there, nor when it might have happened because he doesn't usually work in that area.
