### COMMANDER'S ACTION LINE

*It is understandable that enhancing force protection is a concern right now. However, it is really difficult for pedestrians to walk from Nascer to the base on weekends. Is there a way to man pedestrian gates in Nascer for some predictable period of time on Saturdays and Sundays on in order to allow walkers to come and go from the base without having to walk all the way to the youth center?*

The 65th Mission Support Group worked with the housing security

contractor Securitas to determine times on the weekend that the walking gate along commanders rows in Nascer will be open. On both Saturdays and Sundays that walking gate will be open from 0800-0900 and again from 1500-1600. We hope that this will be more convenient for Nascer housing residents.

## Consumer Advisory Group

The Consumer Advisory Group meets quarterly to discuss issues or concerns that affect the base populace in regards to morale, welfare and recreation business, AAFES and DeCA. Group members consist of representatives from various private organizations and groups on base. Below is a brief summary of some of the issues discussed at the 3rd Quarter meeting.

***Is it possible to get a more varied menu or daily special items at the Ocean View?***

The Ocean View has had daily specials for the past 8 years (taco salad, shrimp basket, etc.). The menu offers all the proteins and is limited to the kitchen size. For example, a larger selection requires a larger grill and hood space. Ocean View is not large enough to accommodate too many options, i.e. 24 hour breakfast.

***When can we expect the Fitness Center to go to a 24-hour schedule?***

USAFE is unsure at this time. They are trying to allocate funding for this Fiscal Year.

***How can we influence what is normally stocked at the Shoppette?***

The shoppette stock assortment is based on our largest category available to all Exchange Express facilities. If there is a particular

item that you are looking for please see a manager or supervisor to check availability and place a customer order.

***What is the process by which local national authorized customers can place special orders in accordance with the NEP?***

Special Orders can be placed through our customer service department using the Shuttle Program. With the Shuttle Program we will see if the item is available at other Exchange locations.

***Can DeCA evaluate shifting the opening hours to later in the day to accommodate the change in population (potentially opening later and closing later)?***

The Commissary is open forty two and half hours a week - these hours were calculated years ago, based on the sales (high sales). Now that existing sales dropped down, more than 50%, the store doesn't qualify for more than 42.5 hrs. Currently we are working with the existing local nationals schedules to see if a change can be made. We are considering have a late day on Thursdays, where the store would be open later in the evening one night a week. This would give airmen an opportunity to shop after work.

Air Force, it can be to the Airmen. Many of the Airmen in the 65th SFS are first term airmen who have not had experience deploying before.
